Dear Michi,

Thanks for your sympathetic words. And thanks for Ron Mamiya's letter. ~~I~~ I think we've all pretty much reached. I'm enclosing a copy of my eulogy which was supposed to be a simple thankz, but the family wanted a little more. Yuriko's mother has gone off on a 1-week vacation with Yuriko's two sisters & their families.

I just called my employment agency and told them to pull me off the job market for at least two months. I will be working full-time on operations and, I hope, the Four Winds took. So that's taken care of, too. Yuriko's going to have to support both of us for a while. She's willing.

Ron Mamiya's letter revealed some real cracks in the National Committee for Redress. Their version of his expulsion certainly does not jibe (~~a stick it give?~~) with the date of his letter. Their story is that, after significant delay (presumably weeks), during which time he intimated he was working on the legislation, did he indicate his unwillingness to prepare the legislation. March 3 to March 12 is only 9 days.

It's really too bad that all this has to go on behind the scenes. It really leaves the ~~work~~-and-job in the dark. Yesterday I talked with Bill Yoshino who is the Midwest Regional Director of JACC. He ~~saw~~ was completely in the dark about Mamiya's departure from the Committee. And, unfortunately, I gave him Tateishi's version which is erroneous. The image that I conjure up is from a very old Second City skit based on ~~Jules~~ Pfeiffer's ~~Fables~~ Fables in which a delegate from a then newly emerging African nation (complete with dashiki and dark glasses) is discoursing on the problems of being an

emerging nation. He ends with, "how the question is, 'Is America ready for democracy?'"

I have not heard from Chin. I will certainly write to Maniwa. I'm not too interested in a national organization to compete with NCR. I think the action is at the local level. But I would certainly join in a coalition of some sort. I clearly see the potential necessity of making a clean break with JACL if it comes to that. Whatever happens, I intend to get the support of other, non-Nikkei groups and to make certain they set their sights on reparations.

I've started on an outline for a book. I'd like to base it on my own experiences since I was in high school at the time, since I was in Manzanar when it happened, and since I had some interesting hassles with the draft and the comp administration when I tried to go back for a visit, and since it's taken me so many years to become enlightened about its political and historical dimensions. I do have a good friend who will help me with theistic and editorial criticism. She is currently enjoying a long vacation in Holland until August. But I would most grateful if you would read and criticize on content.

I must say that I am greatly in your debt for all the documents you've let me read. I really do appreciate things like the Reichs paper and Maniwa's letter and your points on German reparations and all the facts and insights you've given. Your words of praise are marvelous as long as I don't inhale (as ex-mayor Lindsay said).

he thinks one is imminent. Hell, I don't even know how to

go about getting one introduced - yet. Tateishi's rationale

was that Mineta would drop his support of the SACH bill

if another bill was introduced. Doesn't make sense to me.

If it is true, it will have to be Mineta's problem. The world just

isn't that tidy and neat. opinions are very varied at

now always either this or that and no in between never?

either this or that so we have to choose so above now!
