Declaring that the adverse effects of the execution of USAF men in Tokyo would be only temporary, affable D.S. Myer was optimistic about the resettlement program o n his two day visit to the Project.

He pointed out Manzanar, where more people went out on indefinite leaves in March than all of the months previously. He mentioned Tule Lake where 400 had already left on seasonal leaves.

The director discouraged resettlement in Denver, Colo. and Salt Lake City, where it has reached the critical stage of saturation. He said that in all likelihood more hostels would be established by church groups in the large Mid-Western cities.

But America is like that.



Gnastly light of shellfire was making shattered remnants of my makeshift shell-hole appear haunted. The moon a whitish-green palor in the sky, was glowing luridly upon the cold dead bodies of my enemies. Grotesque stumps which once were proud trees displaying arms of magnificent green now looked forlorn and took on inconceivably horrid shapes. Bluish gas eddied and rose from trenches to holes and back to the trenches again, like cold clammy fog mimicking in a nauseating

manner, the spirits of the dead.

I sick, numb, and cold, attempted to comfort my one and only true buddy, who now, was breathing his last As I carressed him, held him painful gasps of air. close to me, my horribly confused brain drifted, back to civilization. Home: The wonderful times we. had We were always together, and had wonderhad there: fully lovable times. Both of German parentage, we decided to join the U.S. army, but due to leve and re-spect for his father, he had turned against me, and now on this cold, crisp winter's night, through fate, God granted that two enemies by cause of warring nations, should stumble upon each other's hearts once again, here in NO-MAN'S-LAND. Then my thoughts were interupted. He was stirring again. Closing my eyes to hide hot tears, I turned my head heavenward and uttered a heartbent prayer. "Oh God, grant me surety that he will die before reinforcements come..thus will I be released from the burden of killing the one I love." With his last spark, my buddy rose at this point, and "Look out!" His body stopped the first slug that was meant for me, as I tried vainly to let them know I was not a German, but too late, the second was marked for me before I could utter a sound. Yes, he used his life that that friendship we lived for would not have been in vain. The captain of the reinforcements, still thinking I was a German, "Well, guess we got those two Deutchers.
