

Commission Will Modify 'Cancel' Order

Revised articles of incorporation of the Gila Co-op Enterprises Inc. was accepted for filing by the Arizona Corporation Commission, the Arizona Republic reported Saturday.

The Corporation Commission said that in a few days it will issue a formal order modifying its previous action in canceling the co-op's articles, the articles having been changed to comply with the commissions' demands.

The new articles specify that the co-operative's activities will be strictly limited to the boundaries of the Gila River Center and its existence to the life of the center.

However, Amos A. Betts and William Peterson, Commissioners, said the Commission will retain "the power to reopen the proceedings whenever in its judgment that seems necessary and appropriate."

"The corporation, to the best of knowledge," the Commissioners said, "has complied with our wishes in the matter, and in so doing, have also met the desires of the people of Arizona."

RIVERS AND ITS CONSTITUTION

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the following article, Lawyer Joe Omachi interprets the Constitution which is to be presented to the people for approval.)

Community self-government is a privilege which has been delegated to the evacuee residents of this center by the War Relocation Authority and the manner and means by which it may be exercised are embodied in the Constitution as drafted by the Constitution Commission and approved by the Project Director.

Under the provisions of this Constitution governmental powers exercisable by the evacuee residents are to be vested in a Community Council composed of representatives elected at general elections to be held semi-annually. Each residential block is entitled to have one representative who must be a resident of the block from which he is elected, at least 21 years of age and eligible for leave clearance under WRA regula-

Seventy seven Gilans, listed by the Japanese government for exchange of nationals, are among the repatriates who will leave for Japan on the exchange

ship Gripsholm on September 1.

Thirteen from Manzanar and 37 from Poston will arrive at Gila 9 p.m. tonight and the 127 from the three centers will leave Phoenix for Jersey City, New Jersey, Saturday morning at 10.

Members of the U. S. Immigration Bureau and the State Department will be here shortly to prepare repatriates for the voyage.

The alien property custodian's office will be here to make proper disposition of property.

The Gripsholm will sail from Jersey City for South America to pick up more exchange nationals. The entire trip to their homeland will take about three months.

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tions. Three or more qualified candidates are to be nominated at a mass meeting in each block. Elections are to be by secret ballot, and the candidate receiving the highest vote in each ballot will be deemed elected. All evacuees 18 years or over who have registered are entitled to vote.

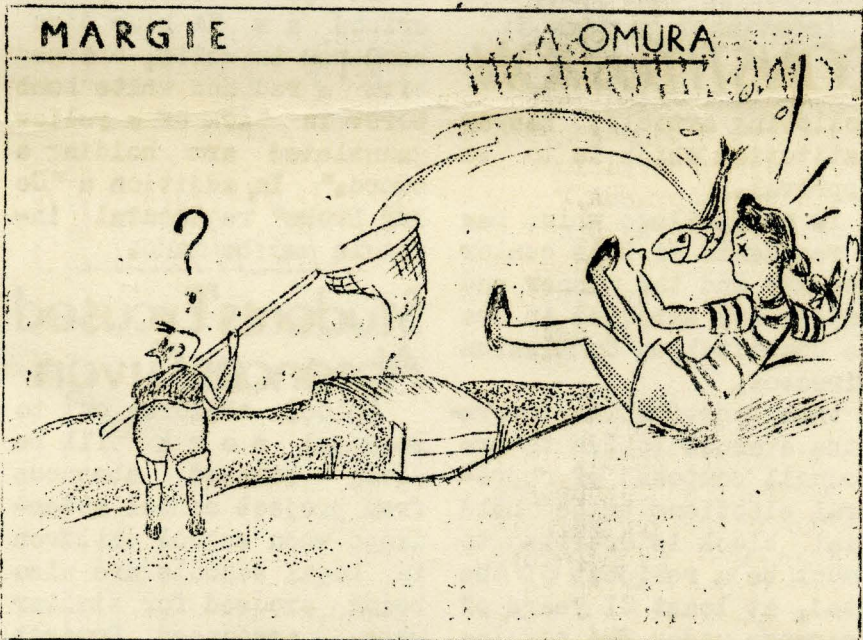
The principal functions of the Community Council are to enact community ordinances and regulations, to obtain and administer community funds, to provide for arbitration of civil disputes, and to make recommendations to the Project Director on any community matter. Ordinances may provide for fines not exceeding \$300, or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than three months, or suspension of work or pay privileges for not more than three months, or any combination of these penalties. An Executive Board is to be appointed by the Council to coordinate the activities of the Community Councils of Butte and Canal and the Project Administration and to perform such other duties as the Council may delegate from time to time.

A Judicial Commission of three qualified residents to serve for one year is to be appointed by the Council to hear and decide specific cases involving violations of community ordinances. Hearings and trials are to be conducted in English and will follow as nearly as possible the procedures of regular courts of law. The defendant will have the right to secure an adviser and may call in witnesses in his behalf. The right to cross-examine witnesses is extended. The Judicial Commission will consider the evidence and render its judgment. The Project Director will review the judgment and may affirm it or remand the case back to the Commission for rehearing with his recommendations.

The Constitution will soon be submitted to the residents of both Canal and Butte for adoption at a special election. The first general election of councilmen will then be held on the third Tuesday following the adoption of the Constitution and the local system of self-government will then be inaugurated and put into operation for the first time within this center.

On Superman & Entertainment In General

Superman, in his concluding statement ending the Japanese episode in his adventure against forces of iniquity in the world declared:

"It shall be remembered that most Japanese Americans are loyal citizens. Many are in combat units of our armed forces, and other are working in war factories. According to government statements, not one act of sabotage was perpetrated in Hawaii or territorial United States by a Japanese American."

The statement was put in the mouth of the "Man of Tomorrow" by creators Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster after protest of scenes which showed subversive activity in a relocation center.

We are disturbed by the compromise of democracy made by too many to the great god of entertainment. There have been stories in the "pulp" and "slicks" and even books which have played up the so-called untrustworthiness of nisei, when government agencies have completely exonerated nisei from any act of sabotage.

Hollywood, with its flare for the sensational, has in at least two movies (Little Tokyo, U. S. A. and Air Force) patched up stories --to the detriment of nisei--based on wild rumors which existed soon after Pearl Harbor and which later were disproved.

In our present all-out war for the four freedoms, the entertainment world has gone all-out for war, but, too often, has ignored the four freedom qualification. War waged for its own sake is sheer destruction, and fails utterly in its ultimate goal--which is peace.

Under the circumstances, the best method of fly control is to prevent fly breeding by the proper disposal of garbage and by covering all rubbish piles.

CROP EXPORTS

Produce raised on 757 acres of the 1,731 will be shipped to other centers.

Some of the major crops are daikon, cabbage, swiss chard, Chinese cabbage, pea, onion, string beans, cucumber and corn.

CHILDREN'S VILLAGE FOR JAPANESE ORPHANS-MANZ.

Nestled in the foothills of the Sierras in Manzanar, is the Children's Village, the only orphanage operated under the direction of the WRA.

Bounded on one side by a luxuriant park, the village comprises three barracks and a population of about 28 children, ranging from infancy to 16 years. The barracks are completely equipped for nursery and child care with miniature furnishings and fixtures.

Mr. and Mrs. Matsumoto, who operated a children's home in Los Angeles before evacuation, are its directors, with public health

and trained nurses on the staff assuring complete medical care. It measures up to national child care requirements.

Pre-school age children attend the village nursery while those of school age attend the center school. Those physically handicapped are taught by private teachers.

SHOPPING SERVICE

The reorganized shopping service of the cooperative enterprises will begin again tomorrow at the dry goods store in Canal and at canteen No. 2 and the dry goods store in Butte.

The shopping service takes miscellaneous orders for goods not available in the center stores. Orders should be placed approximately one week in advance, and a deposit of about 50% of the estimated purchase price is required.

Merchandise will not be delivered; residents must call for articles at the stores.

Butte girls between the ages of 7 and 12 years, inclusive, interested in the Toy and Game Loan sponsored jacks contest should contact the office at 52 rec. hall. While prizes will be awarded the winners. Approximately 25 girls have already registered.

Beginning tomorrow, the contest will be held at 52 rec. hall.

A marble contest for boys between the ages of 7 and 14 is now being held at the same locale. Although the contest has begun, interested boys may still enter by registering at the Toy Loan office.

Compensation

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Full time workers unable to report for work, due to illness, are eligible for illness compensation after exhaustion of sick leave. Illness compensations will be 60 percent of the compensation rate at which the applicant was last employed.

Applications for illness compensation shall be made to the employment division, supported by a medical certificate. Compensation will be paid on a monthly basis for a maximum period of 90 days, provided the recipient re-established his eligibility each 30-day period by submitting a medical certificate.

Minimum ages for employment are 14 in non-factory employment, 16 in factories, and 18 in hazardous jobs. All persons under 18 shall not work more than 8 hours a day or 40 hours a week.

1873 WILL MOVE TO TULE LAKE AS FIRST SEGREGATES FROM GILA

Approximately 1,873 Gilians, including family members who are voluntarily going with other members of the family will be sent

to Tule Lake segregation center in October.

About 860 of the segregants are persons who applied for repatriation or expatriation to Japan, and the other 1,000 are residents who answered "no" to the loyalty question 28. There are more than 350 single men and women to be segregated. The largest single family is one of 13 individuals. There are several families of 10 or more members.

The first trainload from Gila is expected to leave for Tule Lake on October 13, followed by three other trainloads of about 500 each.

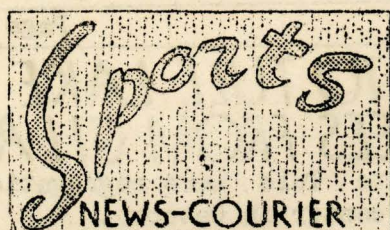
