CENTER'S INITIAL PAY DAY DUE SOON

Pay day at Santa Anita came a step closer to reality when the first pay roll for Center workers was sent to San Francisco yesterday by kenry E. Scofield, Finance division head, it was disclosed today.

The first pay roll was for the fiscal month ending April 15. The date of re-

ceipt of pay checks was held to be indefinite by the division.

The checks on arrival will be delivered by Center Cashier Clyde Lambourne to all those entitled to first checks.

The second pay roll, for the fiscal month between April 15 and May 15, is now being completed.

A total of 1239 persons are listed on the first pay roll. It will be much smeller than subsequent payments as it includes only those who were employed between the time the Center opened, April 3, and Apr total of 12 days. and April 15,

The second pay roll will be more than double the first, it was predicted, because of the larger num-ber of persons employed and the longer period of employ-

Blue Mess Hall Seats 850 and Serves 11.000 Daily

The mess hall with the smallest seating capacity, the Blue, serves the greatest number of "customers," said Al Fields, Mess division superintendent, today.

Opening on April 3, coincident with the opening of the Center, it has been in operation longer than

any other mess hall.

Despite a seating capacity of 850, the Blue mess serves 11,000 meals daily. Every quarter-of-an-hour, 600 people go through the doors. This is at the rate of 40 a minute.

Much of its success, Al Fields said, is due to the smooth teamwork among the crew members.

"But every mess hall crew is cooperating to the full-est degree," Fields added.

"The success of every mess hall depends on the cooperation not only within the crew but also of the people who eat there.

Typhoid capsules are not accepted by competent health authorities as being adequate immunisation, Dr. Norman

Kobayashi warned today.

"It has come to our attention that there are a number of people who have not reported for typhoid injections because they had taken 'typhoid capsules' prior to induction.

"In order to be protected from typhoid fever, we urge people who took only capsuled vaccine to report for regular routine immumisation," Dr. Kobayashi requested.
