Dear Editor,

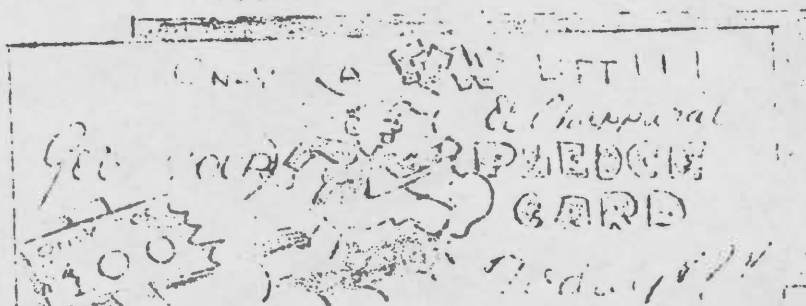
Why don't the Freshman throw a party for Sophomore just like the Junior throw party for Senior (Jr. & Sr. Prompt)? How about it?

The newspaper was published with Ted Kato as Editor-in-Chief, who's responsibility was to check over all materials and to see that the paper came out on time. Aileen Dita as News Editor shared the duties of checking over all the materials and also to assign her reporters to all news articles. Sachiye Mizuki as Business Manager had seen to it that all the supplies were bought on time to Production Manager, Terky Shigemoto, who's job was to have her assistants type and mimeograph the articles with the Adult Education Department's mimeographing machine. Art Editor, Lefty Kivo-

hara had taken the responsibility of drawing all the cartoons and the banner. Icky Miyanaga, Exchange Editor had exchanged papers with other Relocation Centers with the results in Room 18. Betty Kado has acted as the class secretary with Mr. Wells as the advisor.
