
FOREWARD



Mr. Thomas Kishaba--former advisor of the Chemistry Club and science teacher, has relocated to the East and is now enrolled at the University of Minnesota.

Mr. Masao Kodani--with an accent on research work while instructing, he is at present employed as an instructor at the University of Rochester in New York.

Mr. Russell Hayashi--relocated to points East to investigate job-offerings in accounting. He was one of our popular commercial teachers.


OFFICE STAFF

Thank you, the graduating class of 1945, for honoring us with the privilege of serving as your class officers. It has indeed been a very delightful experience, and one which will long be remembered.



JUNIOR HIGH CLASSES


Speaking of the Junior High, Composed of the Seventh and Eighth graders, as a group by itself, the activities carried on were numerous during the past semester.

Commercial Club



A schoolgirl or a schoolboy position is one in which you work for a family from one to two hours a day in exchange for room and board. The work involved may consist of a variety of chores, such as washing the dishes after dinner, mowin' the lawn, stoking the furnace, and seeing that the house doesn't catch on fire while the baby sleeps. In addition to your room and board, you generally earn \$20.00 monthly. Any family who calls the WRA probably is sympathetic to the problems of the Nihonjins.

The rush to relocate came quite late in so far as college entrance was concerned. Many of you desire to go to college will have to wait until next September. In the mean time you can go out and save some money towards paying your tuition.

If you plan definitely on going to school, it is advised that you send in to the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council one of their student questionnaires. They recently announced that they would continue in business until June 1946 and they will be able to help you obtain admission to college and scholarships, too, while they are functioning.

Rev. Clifford Nakadegawa is here from the Student Relocation Council to advise and assist you. He replaces Genial Haruo Ishimaru who in the short time he was here made so many friends. In order to be at your disposal, Rev. Nakadegawa has been assigned a desk in Mrs. Carter's office where he will be available from two to four P.M. daily.

He would like to take this opportunity to tell you how glad he is to be here and how pleased he will be to assist you in your plan.
