WORK OPPORTUNITIES IN CLEVELAND AREA AS OF FEBRUARY 7

This employment bulletin is prepared by the Cleveland Area Office the War Relocation Authority. This area has offices located in Cleveland, Cincinnati, Toledo and Columbus, Ohio; Buffalo, New York, and Detroit and Grand Rapids, Michigan. A sub-office exists at Ann Arbor but communications should be addressed to Detroit.

This digest is designed to show the variety of jobs available; the salary ranges and some requirements. There is, however, no substitute for a personal interview and a look around the prospective place of employment. We have therefore omitted exact names and addresses of the employers.

CITY OF CLEVELAND AND SUBURBS

The Cleveland office is supervised by Fred W. Ross.

HOUSING--In general housing is tight in Cleveland. Rooms for single men immediately available at all times and part-time domestic board and room jobs readily obtainable for girls and boys. Apartments for families difficult but situation easing. Such accommodations are being found slowly but surely. It is well for a member of a family to come out first, get a job, locate housing and bring family.

JOB OFFER DIGEST - MEN

MACHINE SHOP WORKERS

Lathe operators, 10, 75¢ to \$1.05, 55 to 60 hrs. wk. with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40. Openings for lathe hands, shaper men and boring mill operators on same. Some positions are piece work operations. Must have joint board clearance.

RADIO REPAIR

Guaranteed \$50 week, one man, could average over \$100 with commissions.

LOCKSMITH

One man could average \$75 to \$100 with commissions.

AUTOMOBILE MECHANICS

85¢ to \$1.50 an hr., most work 49 hours a week at straight time; some pay  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

BODY AND FENDER

Experienced, \$1.00 to \$1.50 an hour on the same basis as mechanics.

BODY AND FENDER

Learners, 70¢ to 75¢ per hour; number of jobs fluctuate.

AUTO PAINTER

Man with at least 5 years' experience, \$1.50 an hr.

OPTICAL WORKERS

Lens grinders and mounting, 80¢ an hour - 60 hours a week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

RADIATOR REPAIR

Two, 75¢ to \$1.00, 70-hr. week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

SURVEYORS

Two party chiefs, \$150 monthly to start; 2 inexperienced, Transitmen, \$110 to \$125.

<u>CANNERIES</u>	Ten, general work, 75¢ an hour, 54 hours a week, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>PRODUCTION MANAGER</u>	One, at \$52.50 a week for 48 hours.
<u>OPTICIAN, LEARNER</u>	\$40 a week for a 44-hr. week.
<u>BAKERY WORKERS</u>	Eighteen openings. Male Baker's helpers 69¢ an hr. 1st. month, 79¢ an hr. 2nd month, 50-hour minimum work week, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40. Baker, first hand, \$49 per week; baker, second hand, \$46 per week; baker, third hand, \$42 per week. Bakers wage based on 48 hours.
<u>COMMERCIAL ARTIST</u>	One, skilled in lettering, work on commission basis, 60% of take - should average over \$50 a week.
<u>BREWERY WORKERS</u>	Six, 70¢ to 78¢ an hour for general brewery work, 48 hours a week, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>HOTEL EMPLOYEES</u>	Storeroom attendant, \$30 a week and meals; 3 housemen, \$27 a week and meals, 2 busmen, \$3 a day and meals.
<u>CUTTER</u>	One, experienced cutter for custom shirts at \$1.00 per hour.
<u>STATIONARY ENGINEER</u>	One, 80¢ an hour 60-72 hours a week, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40 hours. Should have some knowledge of pipe fitting.
<u>PAINT MANUFACTURING</u>	Two, to learn general paint manufacturing, starting at 75¢ an hour to advance to 90¢, 48-hr. week, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40. Transportation furnished from central point to plant.
<u>SHIPPING CLERKS</u>	Two shipping clerks, \$140 a month to \$160 a month, 44-hour week; 2 stockroom men at 60¢ an hour, 48 hours, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>WELDERS</u>	Four welder learners, 75¢ an hour, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40; 2 experienced, 90¢, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>MOLDERS</u>	70¢ to \$1.20 an hour to start, 60 hours, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>INDUSTRIAL WORKERS</u>	70¢ an hour; 60 hours with $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40. Five at 85¢ an hour, 63 hours, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>MEAT PROCESSING</u>	Six, 75¢ 65 hours, $1\frac{1}{2}$ over 40.
<u>LAUNDRY</u>	Sixteen men, 75¢ to 85¢ to start, 48-60 hours, some $1\frac{1}{2}$ and some straight over 40.

LUMBER YARDMEN

Two, 70¢ an hour to start, advance to 90¢, 48-72 hours,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40, well-furnished house available with job at \$25 a month.

COOPERS

Twenty, 75 $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ an hour, 55 hours per week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

WAREHOUSEMEN

From 75¢ to 80¢ an hour, 54 hours a week.

SEWING MACHINE REPAIRMAN

Starting at \$45 for 44 hours.

OFFICE WORKERS

Typists from \$110 to \$125 a month, 44-hour week; Stenographers, \$115 to \$140, 44-hour week; bookkeepers, \$130 to \$150, 44-hour week average; legal stenographer, \$130 for 40-hour week; telephone operator \$120 for 44-hour week; dictaphone and ediphone operator from \$120 to \$132 for 44-hour week; male stenographers \$163.08 for 44-hr. week.

OPTICAL WORKERS

Girls for inspection work, 65¢ an hour, 48 hours a week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40. Girls for washing and sorting lens, 60¢ an hour, 48 hours a week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40, 70¢ on night shift.

CANNERY

Girls for general work 50¢ to start, can advance to 85¢ an hour, 48 hours a week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

BAKERY WORKERS

Six females, wrap and bag pies, 52¢ an hour, 48 hours a week,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

TEXTILE OPERATORS

Thirty-three females. The union scale for power machine operators is 50¢ per hour for a 48-hour week with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  for over 40. Some of these positions are piece work, others it is possible to advance in hourly rate to 75¢.

INSTITUTIONAL WORKERS

Six registered nurses at \$4.00 a day plus meals; 4 nurses' aides at \$3.50 a day plus board and room; 4 general workers at \$65.00 a month plus board and rm; 2 cooks from \$90 to \$125 a month plus board and room; 1 licensed fireman at \$125 plus board and room.

MEAT PROCESSING

Six girls, 65¢ an hour, 50 hours,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

LAUNDRY

Twelve female, 50¢ an hour to start,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  over 40.

DOMESTICS

100 offers ranging from \$65 to \$100 a month for single girls, in proportion to skill, and \$125 to \$150 for couples depending on experience. In a few cases, offers for outstanding couples run to \$200. Part-time jobs giving single girls and boys an opportunity to earn room and board are also readily available.
