BARBED WIRE SEEN FOR COMMUNITY

The eight watch towers will not be ready for operation by the Military Police pending completion of electricity and telephone connections, the administration announced this week.

The towers will serve as fire look-outs and are equipped with fire-spotters, maps and equipment. They will also be used as observation posts to curb trespassing of center limits between sunset and sunrise.

"We will enforce this regulation in the severest form if necessary," Capt. W. E. Dorland of the Military Police declared.

"Barbed wire fences will outline the center limits in the near future, however, colonists will be permitted to go into the outer area limits between sunrise and sunset."

Hirabayashi, Convicted; Asks For Longer Sentence Term

Stating that his sentence was too short, Gordon Kiyo-shi Hirabayashi, 24-year-old University of Washington senior, asked and received from United States District Judge Lloyd L. Black, a 90-day sentence at his trial in Seattle last Tuesday.

Hirabayashi was convicted on two counts--disobeying defendant appealed, and the sentence was changed to three months on both counts, to be served concurrently at the Federal prison camp at Dupont.

Judge Black first sentenced Hirabayashi to 30 days on each of two counts to be served consecutively with the King County jail recommended. However, the

NM. INTERNEE ARRIVES HERE

First internee to be released from the internment camp at Lordsburg, New Mexico, for this relocation center is Umenatsu Yoshioka, who arrived here Tuesday.

They must be between 20 and 40 years of age and must have the following academic qualifications: (a) high school graduate in the United States; (b) graduate of shogakko and chugakko, preferably; (c) a thorough knowledge of the spoken Japanese; (d) basic elementary knowledge of the kanas and characters coming under the high frequency group, namely 500 or preferably more; (e) a fair knowledge of newspaper Japanese is also very desirable.

Persons admitted to the service will have exactly the same status as all personnel except that greater

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WORKERS HURT ON JOBS MAY GET BENEFITS

Evacuees employed by the War Relocation Authority and injured while on duty will be protected by disability benefits from the United States Employee's compensation commission, according to John A. Nelson, administrative services officer at Heart Mountain, reports the general information bulletin at that center.

The act appropriating funds for the WRA states that the provisions of the act of Feb. 15, 1934, as amended, relating to disability or death compensation and benefits, shall apply to persons receiving from the United States, compensation in the form of subsistence, cash advances or other allowances in accordance with regulations prescribed by the director of the WRA for work performed in connection with the WRA program, including work performed in the WRA Work Corps.

Nelson added that the Washington office of the WRA is at the present time working on a statement of policy and procedure for the guidance of the relocation centers. Until formal procedure for the handling of these cases is established, the Washington office will take up each case individually. At present, each injury must be reported to the division, and a complete record of the injury is obtained for the U.S. Employment Compensation Commission. The entire file is then transmitted to the project director, who in turn sends the file to the Washington office.

GREEN STAMPS REPLACE CASH REGISTER RECEIPTS

Green Co-op stamps have replaced cash register receipts at all community stores and customers will hereafter be issued one green stamp for every 10 cent purchase, John Essene, associate supervisor of community enterprises, announced this week.

The stamp system went into effect yesterday with the arrival of new cash registers Thursday.

Essene indicated an exception would be made in the case of mail order purchases since the Co-op's mail order department is operated with only a small margin of profit.

One green stamp will be given for every 40 cent purchase from either mail-order house.

"Because the patronage refund is ascertained from the amount of green stamps

in the purchaser's book, do not lose or destroy them," Iwao Hora, chief Co-op accountant, said.

Cash receipts issued prior to the green stamps will be redomed and exchanged for a corresponding amount in stamps.

COLONY GETS SIX TRUCKS FROM MONT.

Six 1935 'Roo' dump trucks recently acquired for the project by Harry L. Stafford, project director, have been put to immediate use hauling coal from Jerome, Raymond R. Best, transportation officer, declared Thursday.

Stafford and six evacuee drivers left Hunt Friday, Oct. 23, for Missoula, Mont. They left Missoula Monday with the trucks and arrived back in the project Tuesday night.

The trucks were acquired after Best made negotiations with the Ninth Service Command which supplies all automotive equipment for the project. He indicated Hunt's allotment of trucks is completed.

The evacuees who accompanied Stafford were Sukotsu Eni, Akira Higashi, Harry Yanagimachi, Koichi Kasai and Eddie Yasunaga.

VEGETABLES ARRIVE FROM TULE LAKE

"The vegetables, mainly turnips, carrots and beets are all of first class prime quality," Leon Krumenacker, project steward, said.

The delivery of vegetables will continue for about another month. Tuleans will keep the excess for their own consumption during the winter months, Krumenacker indicated.

WINTERIZING IN PROGRESS

With two 10-man crews on the job, the work of winterizing the buildings here has now progressed to Blks. 2 and 3, Dan Shochan of the Public Works Division reported this week.

Until more laborers are obtained, the two crews, one working down from Blk. 1 and the other starting in the administration area, are now able to finish only a block a week. Shochan added there is an urgent need for workers, and that anyone able to drive a nail is qualified for the work.

Shochan indicated the skirting of the buildings would be covered later with the same building paper as the barracks to enhance the appearance.

People who have dishes belonging to the various dining halls were asked by Chief Steward Leon V. Krumenacker to return them at once.

HIRABAYASHI WILL APPEAL HIS CASE TO HIGHER TRIBUNAL

(Cont'd. from pg.1) to appeal the case to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and the shorter sentence would have given them little or no opportunity. With the first sentence, the 60 days probably would expire before the appeal could be made and a decision handed down, and then the appellate court might feel the defendant had nothing from which to appeal.

In addressing the jury, the defense pointed out that "There never was any issue as to whether he did or did not violate those orders. He admitted it. The issue is whether American citizens are going to

have a trial by jury or whether a military commander, usurping power that wasn't given him by Congress, or by Executive order, which were not authorized by law, can deny these citizens their right of life, liberty, or pursuit of happiness."

Previously the court had overruled a demurrer to the indictment on grounds that in this time of war the civil courts could not question military authority.

This is the first case to contest the Presidential Proclamation, and subsequent evacuation orders of Lt. General John L. DeWitt.
