elected board on matters of policy concerning the

Co-op enterprises.

The total board will consist of 14 members, and will have complete authority to conduct affairs of Co-op Enterprises. Three members, Takeo Nogaki, Yoshio Urakawa and Tadashi Tambara, were elected in the primary election held last Friday night, being the only candidates recoiving a majority of votes cast in that election.

Disbursoment of their long-delayed September pay was begun today by Clarence H. Hurst, fiscal accountant, and will become hard. tomorrow, making them the first group of Hunt weekers to be paid since the recent transfer of the Thi disbursement office fire San Francisco to Portlan .

Meanwhile, a batch of checks-467 of them amounting to \$4,296.46--likewise for September pay, will be given out at 9 n.m. Friday in the recreation hall (across from the administration building), Hurst announced.

Hurst explained that the checks are the first batch of some 2,000 checks for workers, most of whom are still out on farm contracts for harvest work. Since individual notices will not be issued, Hurst asked that all workers who have returned to Hunt report tomorrow morning since their checks may be included in the initial disbursement.

They were specially askod to bring their assignment slips for indentifica-

tion purposes. Workers who fail to report tomorrow morning will have their checks forwarded to them by mail, which may mean a delay of two weeks before they get them, (Cont'd on pg. 7)

Editorial: POLITICS AS USUAL?

We did not believe that citizens of Twin Falls County shared the sentiments which were expressed in a political advertisement which appeared recently in a Twin Falls newspaper.

Our belief was substantiated be ond our expectations

in an editorial in the "imes-News of October 30th.

"Distasteful Advertising", the editorial was titled, and it was mildly put. The political diatribe authoritatively signed "Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer" by the Republicon Central Committee of Twin Falls County committed holesale libel against all Americans of Japanese ances-

The advertisement claimed, among other things, that the government had spont "millions upon millions of dol-Lars to remove Japanese from vital var industries and from any connection with our war efforts and from talting any part in our governmental affairs," notwithstanding that more than 6,000 Americans of Japanese ancostry are serving in the United States Army,

It is not our intention to medale in local political issus. When, however, politiciens twist our evacuation to suit their own ords, they are creating that dis-

unity which Hitler so highly desires.

Incidentally, the Times-News editorial saved two month's wages for a group of indignant Hunt residents who were going to answer the misrepresentations with an advertisement of their own.

CONFIDENTIAL SURVEY HUNT RESIDENTS COMPLETED

After intensive interviewing of 9,174 residents in less than a month and a half, the census was officially completed and records are now being compiled.

Census forms are being made out in quadruplicato forms with two forms being sent to the Regional Of fice in San Francisco, one



PLACING EVACUEES IN RIGHT JOB, WRA PROBLEM

Placing of evacuees in private employment can "utilize their talents and make maximum contribution to society and especially to the war effort" is one of the major problems faced by the WRA Employment Division, E.M. Rowalt, former acting regional director, stated in a letter this week to Placement Officer Harold James.

"Both in fairness to the evacuees and for efficient utilization of their labor supply, we must strongly insist on a discriminating policy, both toward jobs offered and toward evacuees who want to go out into private employment," Rowelt wrote.

The former acting Regional Director's letter also said:

DRIVERS KNOCK OVER 85 FIRE HYDRANT

Hunt drivers are cautioned to be more careful after reports were received yesterday from the Public Works Division that since September 1, out of the 129 hydrants in this community 85 have been km deed over by negligent drivers.

It was pointed out that every time a hydrant is broken, it may necessitate the shutting off of water lines for as much as one-third of the colony, cause extra labor, place an added strain on the other pipes in use.

Under supervision of Glenn R. Green, Associate Construction Supt., rock barriers are now being placed around each hydrant. This protection will not interfere with the use of the hydrants for fire fighting.

WAR STAMPS

To give Hunt residents a chance to put part of their earnings and to invest their idle savings in U.S. War Bonds, the community stores have secured a supply of War Savings Stamps. Change from purchases may now be taken in stamps.

Bonds may be secured through the post office as well as stamps.

Homy Hunt residents have bought War Bonds and by buying them on the project through war stemps or directly, the outside public will be given another indication of the patriotism and localty of Americans of Japanese ancestry.

UNAUTHORIZED RECRUITING HI LABOR BOARD TAKES STEP TO HALT PRACTICE

Getting down to "cases" at its second regular meeting, the Fair Labor Practices Board last Thursday unanimously condemned individual recruiting of evacuee labor for outside farm work as "a practice

open to many abuses," and recommended that the Project Administration take immediate steps to eliminate all activities on the Project bearing any resenblance to a labor contracting agency.

4. Insist that dishos and dish towels be soaked in chlorine solution.

In their report to Frojact Director Herry L. Takigawa stated none of the individuals thus for investigated are guilty of activities guided by desire for personal profit, but added that Veryone having any kind of experionce with labor contracting systems and later sharks is cortainly remiliar with all the shady business that's usually charactoristic of thom."

He further decisned that continuation of the practico in improper hands may serve to antagonize the outside public if such agents set outside growers against one another for selfish bargaining purposes.

The Board also announced that the Administration has agreed to act immediately on the recommendation that recreation halls be furnished with chairs, tables, radios and so forth for the benefit of Project workers.

According to Hurst, tho September payroll will total \$39,949.36, which will be paid to 3,491 workers.

Individuals who paychocks not rightfully their own are subject to arrest and prosecution under federal laws, Capt. Clarence D. Lee, !internal socurity officer, pointed out this wook.

Lee cited two instancos whore claimants not rightfully entitled to paychocks accopted and cashed them, thus committing a federal offense.

He warned that the U.S. Secret Service would arrest anyone intentionally accepting and cashing enother's paychock.
