A pioneer contingent of 250 volunteers is slated to leave for the 21,000 ac re TuleLake relocation cen ter in northern California tonight at approximately

eight o'clock.

The local vanguard work-crew will be joined by a group of 100 from the Puyallup Assembly center due here from the north sometime this evening. At some prearranged point, the two crews will then proceed south to their destination According to Ernest Leonetti, W.C.C.A. manager, a full-cross section of the required work staff has been recruited.

Instigated by encouraging letters 'n telephone calls from friends and relatives already at the beet fields 50 more volunteers, have signed up to leave by train for Eastern Oregon Wednesday night at 8 P. M.

Those leaving are to have their baggage readyby 3 PM

tomorrow.

According to Ernest Leonetti, Mrs. Adams will be at the Information Bureau to sign up volunteers up till noon Wednesday, May 27

The Salem, Albany, Corvallis, and Eugene groups will leave by train but the Medford evacuees will be convoyed in buses.


### 20 PASS FIRE EXAM

Nellie Arai and Alice Toyota made the general arrangements while the foods wore in charge of Alice Ka wasaki.


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### LADIES' RENDEZVOUS
