EMPLOYMENT DEPT. ON DUTY

A problem child--an outgrowth of the intricacies of the present economic system is the matter of unemployment, and even in this Center, employment is something of a problem. However with the able performance of the Employment Office under manager George Yamauchi, a smooth functioning order has been created.

Employment was originally solicited and placed by the JACL but with the increasing population and work, it was necessary to establish a separate department. Under the super vision of Mr. H.A. Sandborg, part of the original upstairs office force was used as a nucleus.

If a position is open in a department, the foreman will fill out a 401 requisition slip which is appro ved by Mr. Sandberg and then sent to the employment office where applicants for that particular job are filed. Final consideration is up to the de partment, but applicants are usually picked in the order of registration and qualifications. Formorly applicants often made direct contacts with dopartnents but such methods have been discouraged, and no favoritism is shown. The biggest problem of the office is the difficulties of obtaining enough menial laborers, especially among the Niscis.

The employment office has 3 office staff members beside the manager, and 3 foremen to solicit laborers. A complete list of those 16 years and over with experience and qualifications of each person is kept on file. Out of approximately 1500 registered for work, there are 1180 presently employed in this Center.
