## WORK CORPS LEAVES FOR IDAHO Sugar Beet Field Call 200 Volunteers

Leaving Manzanar this noon on special busses, headed for the sugar beet fields in Rupert, Idaho, were approximately 135 volunteer workers for the Amalgamated Sugar Corporation. Registration for this work has been conducted since Sunday morning through the U.S. Employment Service. J. J. Dunbar, representative of the company, conferred with many prospects during his visit here.

### SALARY AND EXPENSES

It was revealed that the wages paid this season will be 22% higher than it was last year. Thinning will bring \$9.50 an acre; first hoeing, \$2.50; and second hoeing, \$1.50. Six weeks is expected to complete this work, with provisions that if the worker is dissatisfied, he may return at the expiration of this period.

Should the person desire to remain, he may seek other employment within that county. Workers with dependents here will be required to pay \$20 a month expenses for each person. Farm-security camps will be provided for, but each person will put in 2 hours work a week for maintenance of their quarters. Food will be bought wholesale, and workers will share expenses, but individual cooking will be permitted.

### NOT TO BE KEPT IN CUSTODY

Contrary to rumors, the laborers will not be kept under constant surveillance by the government. They will be allowed to travel freely within the county with the curfew hour set at 8 p.m.

## NEW WRA MEN REPORT TO WORK

Replacing former WCCA officials who left for other centers last week, six WRA employees reported for duty this week to augment the local administrative staff headed by Roy Nash, project director.

Heading the transportation and supply section is R.R. Best, while the Community Service Division, formerly run by J.M. Kidwell, is now under Thomas Temple.

J.B. Peters is new chief of the Finance Division, Howard Mann takes over the Procurement office and Wm. Hall will operate as chief steward.

Arthur Miller, formerly Medical Section chief under WCCA, is now running both the Medical, and Personnel and Employment Division.

## UNOCCUPIED BLOCKS OPENED TO RELIEVE HOUSING PROBLEMS

### MOVEMENTS OKAYED

Gradual adjustment of overcrowded housing conditions was foreseen today as unfreezing of movements was announced by Housing Coordinator George Kurata.

### PARTITIONS PROMISED

Newly completed unoccupied blocks will be opened to receive occupants. While the green signal for minimum partitions insuring privacy was given by Arthur Miller, new chief of the division, plans are yet in the blueprint stage.

### CHOOSE CAREFULLY

With the exception of a possible two or three hundred persons yet to come, the present population is considered stable and all movements made at this time will be permanent. Utmost discrimination in the selection of compatible families sharing one apartment will be exercised.

Here on a quick inspection tour to familiarize himself with local conditions and to lubricate the transfer of the center from WCCA to WRA, the colonel left Monday afternoon for San Francisco. After a flying visit to Tule Lake he will return to Washington reporting to Milton L. Eisenhower. Together they will determine future policies.

With the exception of unavoidable crowded housing conditions, he expressed satisfaction with the progress of the center.

## THE FREE PRESS

We want to repeat again that the Free Press belongs to the people of Manzanar, that, instead of being merely the mouthpiece of the administration, it strives to express the opinions of the evacuees in the solution of immediate and foreseen problems.

## OUR NEW POLICY

Although we have had no set policy, the time has arrived when a definite program must be outlined and a clear-cut goal set up. We welcome constructive criticisms and suggestions based on facts for the improvement of the paper and the betterment of the community. The Manzanar Free Press must be the barometer of community thought and action.

If possible, we want to be the open forum for discussion of administration policies because those policies will directly affect every individual here. We know that the administration will welcome a healthy and active interest on the part of the residents as it is only with harmonious cooperation that our Shangri-La can be built.

## LIVE THINKING NEEDED

We need live and alert thinking. No democracy can survive if its citizens take the line of least resistance. Independent thought, free and unbiased criticism and constructive purpose are needed. Only so can we be good citizens in this trying period of transition.

Ours may be a voice crying in the desert wilderness, but let it be a creative voice of true Americans, conducting on our own front the same essential fight for democracy.

## WAR EFFORT PROGRAM MOVES INTO HIGH GEAR

By making camouflage netting, Manzanar will definitely take part in the nation's vast war program with the completion of four buildings on the south side of the center.

Twenty men, now taking instructions under Army engineers, will help supervise the project. Approximately six hundred men

and women will be employed as this undertaking moves into high gear, it was revealed by J.A. Forney of the United States Engineering dept.

Five men will be assigned to a net twenty feet square with a rigger to pull the netting skyward as the work progresses.

## DEAR EDITOR TO THE FREE PRESS,

I am one of the boys leaving for the beet fields in Idaho and I wish to make a few observations before my departure.

The indisposition of the Japanese to sign-up is attributable to one main fact: that their return here after the season was not guaranteed in writing.

The majority of the bachelors and family men are fearful that, due to expediency, the government might dump them in some center in Idaho or nearby area. There has been one breach of faith; another will lower the morale among the Japanese of this center.

I suggest that the Manzanar Free Press carry an editorial stressing the need of a Labor Council made up of Japanese to sit in on all labor recruiting meetings in the future.

As long as labor from this center is not conscripted, and we more or less freely volunteer for work in the outside communities, the council can safeguard the migrant laborers' among us by carefully probing into the contracts. Satisfaction will result on the part of the farm laborers, and morale will be boosted.

This council should not be the block leaders, but could work with them.

I am in the contingent leaving for Idaho, and with

## POSTON, TULE LAKE DESIGNATED NEW RELOCATION CENTERS

From the temporary assembly and reception centers, approximately 11,000 evacuated Japanese will be transferred to more permanent homes in Poston Relocation Center near Parker, Arizona and in Tule

Lake Relocation Center, Northern California, starting June 15, the Western Defense Command announced.

To facilitate the movement of Japanese from Military Area 2, which lies westward of Area 1, Civil Control Administration stations have been set up at Chico, Marysville, Auburn, Reedley and Visalia. New location centers are being prepared in eastern Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming, and Arkansas.
