This new Buddhist hostel has accommodations for 30 to 35 persons, and is opened to both Buddhist and non-Buddhists. to au to both

The building consists of several classrooms, each partitioned to allow privacy.

# Manzanar Honors Late President At Memorial Services

MAZANAR, Calif., April 21 —Impressive memorial rites held in honor of the late president Roosevelt at the Manzanar Com-munity Auditorium on Sunday were attended by evacuees, A-merican soldiers of many racial origine and Longnee, Americane in United States army uniforms, many wearing battle stars.

many wearing battle stars. Speaking at the services Pro-ject Director Ralph P. Merritt said, "At this very moment, lib-erty loving people of the yorld are standing in thought and spir-it by an open grave. Franklin Delano Roosevelt is dead. More than the 32nd president of the United States, more than the Commander-in-chief of its armies and navies, he was a great soul leading the crusade for freedom for all people. Never in all his tory has one man's death been so widely mourned. Never in all history has one man's death then bistory has one man's death uni-ted so many people in the com-mon purpose of keeping alive those ideals for which he lived and for which he died."

Quoting from the president Mr. Merritt told the mourners, "The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart. American-ism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry." For every human need he seemed to hold realizable hope of achieve-ment."

Father Steinbach, a Maryknoll Father interned by the Japanese and returned to this country on the Gripsholm, read the Cathol-ic prayers.

We are reminded of Mr. Nagata's picture by the advice given resettlers in a press release appearing in this weeks Relocation Supplement. It comes from the New Orleans, Louisiana Relocation Office. In addition to ideal climate, the story points out that much undeveloped farm, vegetable and grazing land is available at low prices. It further indicates that the citrus fruit and vegetable industry is in its "infancy stage."

The south has long been recognized as an ideal place for Issei and Nisei. In Lincoln High School, back in the winter of 1938, a mission-ary came to speak to the assem-by in the new auditorium. He spoke of his life among the Chi-nese, the ignorance and misun-derstanding he overcame in order to bring Christianity into their world. He was an excellent orat-or. And when he began speaking of the Panay sinking and denou-nced the entire population for the brutal behavior of the Jap-anese, the Nisei students squir-med uncomfortably in their seats. He condemned the Japanese race in general and we were burned by the fire of his hatred.

by the fire of his hatred. I remember someone whisp-ered: "Let's get out of here." "No, we're too far up in front." "Why make a comotion?" We didn't leave but during the second assembly, all the Nisei boys walked out. It caused en-ough furor that the third assem-bly was cancelled. That was our first painful blow with neriudice. We were

bly was cancelled. That was our first 'painful blow with prejudice. We were freshmen and none of us forgot it. Since then Pearl Harbort ev-acuation, confinement and relo-cation have made us sensitively aware of the factor we have all known all our life—our racial difference.

aware of the latter we have an known all our life—our racial difference. Perhaps, I am unusually lucky —knock on wood. I have encoun-tered twice as much good will and tolerance than bad. I have been morseful. I felt pride surge up-ward when someone praised the Japanese. I felt shame when a stranger asked: "Why is it you young people don't know enough of the Japanese language?" In Madison, two drunken sold-iers began a conversation with us by threatening to harm us because we were "Japs.", After half an hour of chatter, they ap-logized and agreed that we had guite a sense of humor. They insisted that we accompany them to the USO center. What a time we had getting out of that one! Another Air Corps cadet stop-ped us in church to ask if we were from California. He attend-ed Venice High School and lost track of a Nisei pal who was "sure a swell mechanic." While apartment hunting in Chicago, we were refused be-cause "they didn't want Orien-als." With the intent of staying at the YMCA for at least two weeks we were very much perplexed when notified that we must be on our way in two days. So we got busy and went to look around for a place.

After several "Sorry, it's tak-en" and "come back later," we decided to try another place. A young lady answered the door bell.

#### Indians Wanted

Indians Wanted "We don't want Indians here," she said, adding that "they drink too much and stay out late." We broke out laughing and told her that we were Japanes Americans.

Then that we wild obtained americans. Then she replied that the room was already taken. Later, we found a room with a kitchenette. However, after the first night, we wanted to move out because there were bed bugs. No, Chicago isn't the only place that has bed bugs but ours was a "crummy place" if not the crummiest in the eastside. We found a place in the south-side but had to move out when the neighbors complained about our "color." Mari Okazaki Former Manzanite Mari Oka-

Former Manzanite Mari Oka-zaki helped us tremendously in our early stay here on housing and other matters. We later found housing by liv-

and other matters. We later found housing by liv-ing seperately since housing for three is hard to find. Looking for a job was not as easy as we expected due to the wages and type of work. For information, we went to see Miss Grace Kelley at the Milwaukee Vocational School and ahe suggested the Signal Battery Co., a defense plant. We went there and put in our applications, but could not be employed there without a Wosh-ington clearance. The financial situation at that time was not too merry and did not permit us to linger on much longer. Through Lt. Commander Slo-

Through Lt. Commander Slo-cum, head of the War Manpower Commission, we found jobs at the Air Reduction Sales Co., popular-ly.known as "Airco"—a nation-ally esablished firm. We are now pretty well set-tled in Milwauke only after 8 months. Yes, it takes quite some time before one can become time before one can become time or at work.
