PVT. OTA

Accident Proves Fatal To Gila

Mr. and Mrs. Katsuta, Ota of 25-B-A were informed yesterday that their son, Pvt. George Ota, 24, was killed while training at Camp Shelby when a trench mortar exploded. There was no details of the accident in the telegram.

Ota, formerly of Parlier, California, left for Ft. Douglas, Utah, with the third group of inductees on June 20, 1944. Arriving at Camp Shelby on June 30, he trained with the 1st Battalion, Co. D, 442nd Infantry.

After graduating from Fresno Technical Junior College in 1941, he specialized in auto mechanics.

Besides his parents he is survived by one married brother and three sisters.

MEMORIAL SERVICE HELD FOR OTANI

A Buddhist memorial service honoring S/Sgt. Kazuo Otani, who was killed in action on July 15, was held in the Canal auditorium last Saturday.

Following the military presentation of colors by the color guards, messages were delivered by Earl H. Goodman, project; G. P. Young, veteran's group; Takato Hamai, Canal council; Shimpei Tanaka, Butte Servicemen's Association; Tamijiro Mori, Canal Servicemen's Association; and Kikue Shirakawa, block 22.

In behalf of the Veterans' Administration, Young presented Yoichi Otani with the flag for which S/Sgt. Otani had given his life. Taps resounded as the flag changed hands.

Shusuko Uchiyama rendered the family's thanks, bringing to a close Canal's third memorial service.

SOLDIER WRITES ON BATTLEFRONT

Pvt. Kayo Endo, formerly of Gila, dropped a short line to the project from somewhere in Italy, in a letter dated July 27.

"Have now experienced combat duty in reality," he writes. "It was very long, weary, and awful."

"A great many of the men in this outfit showed great fight and courage," he continues. "Most of the towns and cities are partly or greatly war-torn."

Coast Papers Recognize Nisei

News reports of Gila's young men who are serving in the U.S. Army have been carried by the home town California newspapers which are kept informed by the Reports Office of this center.

The Santa Maria Times, carried the names of the nisei inductees of Gila who were former residents of Guadalupe and Santa Maria. Others like the Santa Barbara News Press, Alameda Times Star, and the Vacaville Reporter have carried stories of nisei inductees and casualties from Gila.

PVT. SHIOMICHI KILLED IN ITALY

Pvt. Joe Shiomi, brother-in-law of Shaw Kojaku, whose funeral service was conducted yesterday, was killed on July 19 on the Italy front, his relatives were notified.

Pvt. Shiomichi, formerly of Brawley, California, was inducted from Poston in August, 1943. He was sent overseas in June, 1944.

He attended the University of California.

He is survived by his wife, Miya, who relocated to Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

SERVICE

Tribute To Pfc. Kojaku Held

Butte paid tribute to it's first son to be killed in action, Pfc. Shaw Kojaku, formerly of 72-12-C, with a n impressive Christian service yesterday in the high school auditorium.

The last rites consisted of the posting of the colors by the military guard, violin selections by Tomio Yagura, sermon by the Rev. Yasuburo Tsuda, and prayer by the Rev. Y. Oshita.

Messages were given by Paul Morton, administration; George Nishimura, community council; W. C. Sawyer, Ex - servicemen; Shimpei Tanaka, Servicemen's Parents and Relatives; and Shotaro Hikida, community at large.

The flag for which Kojaku gave his life was lowered from the wall, and presented to the family by W.C. "Tom" Sawyer and Joseph Keseki. While the audience of approximately 1000 stood with bowed heads, the taps were sounded, and the flag changed hands.

WIND-PIG

Jobs offered in Wisconsin do not provide as large a starting salary as may be found in larger industrial cities, but evacuees who have relocated in the Milwaukee and Madison areas have become part of the community and are well pleased because the cost of living is lower, housing is better, cities are cleaner and greener, and the local people are friendly and helpful. Below is a summary of the jobs available:

DRY CLEANERS - Spotters, pressers, cleaners. Inexperienced, 50¢ an hour to start; experienced, 85¢ to 90¢ an hour; 1½ after 44 hours. Opportunity for as much overtime as desired. Men or women.

AUTO MECHANICS - Unlimited. 75¢ to \$1 per hour. Milwaukee, Madison.

BUS BOYS - Several wanted. \$65 per month, room and board.

COOKS - One for Madison hotel. \$140 a month and meals. One for camp at Lake Tamahawk, Wisconsin, \$100 per month and \$10 per month bonus, full maintenance. State Civil Service.

DOMESTIC COUPLES - Couple for estate near Kenosha. Man for gardening, outdoor services; wife for house work, cooking. Employer's family lives in Chicago, visits estate two or three times weekly. Issei couple lives on farm about two miles away. Year-round employment. \$125 per month, full maintenance.

DRY CLEANERS

Couple. Woman for general domestic duties. Man to care for garden, orchard, few cows, riding horses. Separate housing. \$100 plus maintenance. Couple. Small family acceptable. Woman for general household duties, man to care for garden and some poultry. Separate 3-room house. \$100 per month plus housing, heat, light, garden space, eggs, etc. Madison.

GEORGE**Explains Food Processing**

L.N. George, vocational agriculture teacher in Canal High School, is acting superintendent of industries while Hoyt Martin is taking a vacation.

George states that food processing is both economical and educational. Processing, which means canning, drying, and freezing, saves all the surplus and provides better and cheaper foods.

"The first necessity is an Al product," says George. He adds that if there is a shortage of water and rich soil, cut down the acreage, fertilize, and water the crop regularly. The crop of standard vegetables produced is processed in order to be available until another crop comes on. By raising more tomatoes than can be used during the six weeks of harvest time, and then canning the surplus, the product can be consumed the year around. This is economy in practice.

George concludes that this knowledge is every bit as cultural as knowing the Caesars by their first names, or even being able to quote Shakespeare.

DENVER COURT CONVICTS NISEI SISTERS OF TREASON

Three nisei sisters on treason trial in Denver for helping two Germans soldiers to escape from a war prisoners' camp were convicted Friday of conspiracy to commit treason, according to a UT report.

The penalty will be set by Federal Judge J. Foster Symes. The possible maximum punishment is 2 years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

The women, escaping, a possible death sentence, are being found guilty only on conspiracy charge. They were acquitted on the treason accusation.

The trial marked the third time that treason

had been charged since the start of World War II. In the nation's history there has not been a single execution for the crime of treason against the United States.

THREE DRAFT EVADERS HELD

Three Japanese American residents of the Poston Relocation Center were ordered held for action of the federal grand jury Saturday on charges of refusing to be inducted into the armed forces, according to an AP report. The accused are Satoru Okazaki, 24; Kunio Nagata, 19; and Suteo Bill Mori, 20.

Toru Hirai, 28-year-old Japanese American of Poston, was brought before U.S. Commissioner Friday on a charge of a selective service violation in Phoenix. He was charged with refusal to submit to induction into the armed forces.

**RELOCATION HEAD LAUDS JAPANESE**

"They work hard, pay their bills, mind their own business, keep their homes neat, and their children in their own yards. They like Cincinnati and Cincinnati has shown it likes them."

That was the description of Japanese Americans given by Harry Titus, WRA relocation officer of the Cincinnati area, in an article written by Edwin Below of the Cincinnati Post last week.

Writer Below describes in particular the family of San Tamura, former resident of Jerome, who is working on a farm near New Richmond, O. Approximately 323 evacuees have resettled in Greater Cincinnati and are striving to rebuild their interrupted lives, the article states.

Many kindly citizens have put aside racial prejudices and are lending a helping hand. Such a citizen is Erwin J. Schilderink, an owner of a large farm near New Richmond, who has discussed the possibilities of working with evacuees on his farm. He commented, "I'm sympathetic with the plight of these unfortunate people, and am willing to help make a place in the community for them." He also added that "We know these people are excellent farmers."

AMACHE SERIES ANTICIPATED FOR FRIDAY

MAJOR LEAGUER YEARS ANOTHER TRIP WITH HAWAII NISEI PALS

"Some of those Hawaiian Japanese were really good guys; they were educated in our school and their thinking was American, and we had a lot of fun."

So, quoted the St. Louis (Mo.) Sporting News of Sigmund (Jack) Jakucki, hurler of the American League's pace-setting St. Louis Browns in referring to the times he spent with nisei baseball players of Hawaii in earlier days.

Jakucki, himself a n

American of Polish descent got his start in big-time baseball with the famous Honolulu Asahis (now Athletics) and Broncos, noted the Sporting News.

Jakucki, concluded the Sporting News article, made two trips to the Orient with the powerful Asahis before Pearl Harbor, and his No. one post-war wish is to make one more Pacific jaunt and take the mound in Japan's Meiji Stadium again with his old Honolulu nisei pals.

War correspondent Ernie Pyle, former major league ballplayer whose noted column appears in over 300 newspapers, recently had good words for Japanese American soldiers fighting in Italy. Pyle toured Japan in 1929 as an undergraduate publicity man with the University of Indiana's good-will baseball team.

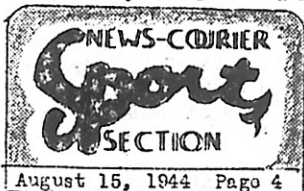
