Mr. and Mrs. Katsuta Ota of 25-8-A were in-Katsuta yesterday that their son, Pvt. George Ota, 24, was killed while training at Camp Shelby when a trench mortar exploded. There was no details of the accident in the telogram.

Ota, formerly of Parlier, California, left for Ft. Douglas, Utah, with the third group of inductees on June 20, 1944. Arriving at Comp Shelby on June 30, he trained with the 1st Battalion, Co. D, 442nd Infantry.

After, graduating from Fresno Technical Junior College in 1941, he specialized in automochanics.

Besides his parents he is survived by one married brother and three sisters.

Explains food Processing

L.N. George, vocational agriculture teacher in Canal High School, is acting superintendent of industries while Hovt Martin is taking a vacation.

George states that food processing is both economical and educational . Processing, which moans conning, drying, and freezing, saves all the surplus and provides better and cheaper foods.

The first necessity an Al product." says George. He adds that if there is a shortage of water and rich soil, cut down the acreage, fertilize, and water the crop regularly. The crop of standard vegetables produced is processed in order to be available until another crop comes on. By raising more toratoes than can be used during the six weeks of harvest time, and then canning the surplus, the product can be con sumed the year around. This is economy in practice.

"They work hard, pay their bills, mind their own business, keep their homes neat, and their chil dren in their own yards. They like Cincinnati and Cincinnati has shown it Thoy likes them."

That was the description of Japanese Americans Given, by Harry Titus, WRA relocation officer of the Cincinnati area, in an articlo written by Edwin Below of the Cincinnati Post last week.

Writer Below describes in particular the family of Sam Tamura, former Sam Tamura, fo rmor resident of Jerome, who is working on a farm near New Richmond, C. Approximately 323 evacuees have resettled in Greater Cincinnati and are striving to rebuild their intorrupted lives, the article states.

Many kindly citizens have put aside racial prejudices and are lending a helping hand. Such a citizen is Erwin J. Schilderink, an owner of a large farm near New Richmond, who has discussed the possiblities of working with evacuees on his farm. commented , "I'm sympathetic with the plight of those unfortunate people, and am willing to help make a place in the community for thomen H o also added that "We know these people are excellent farmers."
