In a second move to alleviate the Center's critical labor situation, Gila's Man Power Executive Committee on Thursday, placed an age ceiling on Thursday, four mess hall jobs. Hereafter no men under fifty will be assigned as dishwashers, potwashers, pantry clerks or timecheckers. Men under fifty now holdthese positions will b o transferred to more Valuable assignments and replaced by women or older men. Through this program the Committee hope s to jar loose able bodied men now performing work in mess halls which could be done by women. These persons will then be available for more pressing jobs.

The Committoe also tackled the mess operations truck stampers problem. It doveloped that swampers have been making deliveries only to the mess hall door, the pantry clerks taking it inside for storage. This system not only results in damage to the food but requires mess halls to maintain husky pantry clerks to handle it. It was recommended that the Supply Officer swampers to deliver merchandise inside the mess hall as directed by the Chef.

THOMAS

Expresses Views On Evacuation

Californians who oppose the return of the Japanese Americans to their homes in California "legally, i f possible, "Thegally i f Locessary," do not believe in democracy, Norman Thomas, presidential candidate of the Socialist party, declared in a campaign speech before a San Francisco club on Sept.26, according to the AP.

Thomas said the flareup of "racism" against the California - born Japanese is "a far greater danger to American liberty in general than to the Japanese Americans in particular."

He stated that "What was done on the west coast was, as Justice Murphy admitted, painfully similar in principle to the German treatment of the Jows."

Thomas insisted "greed for land made fertile by Japanese skill and labor was partly at the bottom of the herding of these American citizens into concentration camps. Thomas argued that if military nocessity dictated the treatment accorded thom, they should be paid damages for what was done to thom, "just as we give property owners damage for things done to their proparty under military necessity."

GILANS NAMED IN ESCHEAT CASE

The state of California has started an escheat action in Fresno Co. against Mr. and Mrs. Tamigoro Chiamori, residents of Canal, and their two sons, Akirdand Yasushi.

The escheat case intervalves an 80 acre orchard and vineyard land, valued at \$50,000, which is located one mile southwest of Parlier. The state charges that it was owned by aliens of Japanese ancestry in violation of the state anti-alien land law.

The potition alleges that the alien Japanese obtained title to the preperty as the distributed of sen, Tiyashi, who had died. The property was

PARENTS' RESPONSIBILITY

The importance of the home, school, and religion in a child's life; was outlined by Cedil F. Andres, assistant counselor of the social welfare section, in a talk entitled "Juvenile Delinquency-A Challenge to Paronts," delivered before a meeting of the Butte Elementary PTA last week.

One of the hig factors leading to juvenile delinquency is unhappiness, turmoil, and discord between parents within the home, the one place where a child looks for support though all else in the world may fall apart.

A SECURE HOME

Mrs. Andres stated that the most important influence in a child's life is his home, his parents, and family life. To a child his parents represent almost God-like beings. A child must have a sense of "home" as a place where no harm can come to him because his parents are there. He should have the feeling of security of acceptance and understanding. Parents must set a constant example of honorable character for the child to follow.

It is not were chance that the greater number of delinquents come from broken homes where parents are separated, divorced, or where there is such unhappiness between the parents that it almost soaks into the child's body.

When a child enters school, the teacher can only share but nover completely take over the parents' responsibility. The child must have definite hours for study at home. The parents must see to it that he is never unnecessarily absent since such habits lead to laziness, discouragement, and failure. When a parent fails to meet this obligation, when a child truants, then the community must step in because such neglect can be a threat to all.

Religious training is of utmost importance. It is one of the greatest sources of ethics, faith, courage, and comfort.

COMMUNITY'S PART

How can society as a group prevent juvenile delinquency? Youth must be given outlets to their natural instincts for dare and adventure. A youth center might be a solution. A clubroom, p rhaps, where boys can make as much noise as they want without being bothered, play games, turn on the radio or phonograph. They can be taught to make things such as airplanes, cabinets, desks, or clar articles. Exhibitions of these articles will serve to give incentive to their efforts. They must be given tools of learning, for play, and for works.

NISEI TEST CASES TAKEN BEFORE SUPREME COURT

The Korematsu and Endo found. cases, testing the constitutionality of evacuating and confining American citizens of Japanese ancestry, were taken before orty" said to be contho United States Supreme Court on Tuesday, according to the AP release.

Frod Korematsu, formerof Oakland, asked the high tribunal to rule on the validity of evacuation orders which resulted in his boing placed in the Topaz WRA Center. Mitsu ye Endo, formerly of Sacramento, demands freed on from the same center and a court declaration that she has the right to go wherever she pleases.

The court was told that there is no question of loyalty of either to United States, and that there was no evidence Japanese involving any American citizen in espionage or sabotage on the

wost coast.

ACTION UNINTENDED Attorneys for Korematsu charged that neither congress nor the President intended such action and said that only in Nazi German could a simil or "imprisonment program" be

Counsel for Miss Endo centended that the only legal ground for her detention was "implied authferred by Congress and the President.

Solicitor General Charles Fahy urged the court to consider circumstances involved in the cases in the light of sccrificos made by millions other citizens so far of in the war.

Fahy said that after the attack on Pearl Harbor, ovacuation and detention were necessary, that it has always been the gowrnment's plan to restore evacues to full liberty circumstances as soon as permit, and stated the people concerned had been treated in a "fair and decent manner."
