Senator Chandler Outlines Veg. Pilfering Evacuee Disposition Program Causes Shortage

Just after he had returned from a first-hand view the relocation centers including Rivers, Senator A. B. Chandler, chairman of a sub-committee of the Senate Military Affairs Committee, outlined three steps of his proposed program for the disposition of evacuees and the centers.

The three steps, he explained, are: (1) all who will voluntoer or who can be drafted should be put the army; (2) disloyal should be imprisoned in concentration camps; (3) those who are loyal and able to work should be certified by the FBI and allowed to take jobs.

The senator said that this was his personal view and he could not yet speak for his sub-committee, which will meet next Tuesday to consider what recommendations to make.

Chandler stated his intention was to save the country a substantial part of the money WRA is spending. The WRA was

The Enterprises spiked runors that fish sold on Fridays in Butte were leftovers from Thursday's BEET WORKERS sales in Canal. They stated that each sale is a sell-out, and there is no possibility of the above.

PEAS, BERRIES MAY. BE CURTAILED

Because residents have been going out to the farm and :picking peas without authority, a shortage has been created and it has not been possible for an equal distribution among the mess halls, announced David Rogers, the Farm Management.

A similar situation has been created with the strawberry crop, and unless people cease to pick the crop and destroy the plants, there will not be many strawberries available for local consumption, it was pointed out.

· Plenty of melons and cantaloupes will be available for the mess halls shortly, stated Rogers, which will be a genuine treat for the warm summer
