TIME GIVEN TO REVISE'NO 'REPLY TO QUESTION 27

Residents who have answered "no" to question 27 in the military registration and "yes" to question 28 have an opportunity to revise their answer to question 27 at Mr. Cornwall's office in Administration Building 1 up to Wednesday, March 10, it was announced today. It may be recalled that question 27 deals with willingness to serve in the armed forces of the U.S.

A negative answer to question 27, with a positive answer to question 28, seems inconsistent, and such a method of answering has been interpreted by some as placing the answerers in the category of conscientious objectors.

Until a national policy has been established, the Project Director at Topaz is not granting passes to leave the area to persons who have answered in the negative to either question 27 or 28.
