INDEFINITELEAVE GIVEN TO SERVE IN ARMED FORCES

A change in WRA Administrative Instruction No. 22 has been made for the benefit of those enlisting for the U.S. armed forces, Project Director Charles F. Ernst was informed yesterday from Washington.

The changed paragraph reads as follows:

"Issuance of indefinite leave to serve in the armed forces. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other paragraph in this section IV, when an evacuee is notified by a local selective service board to report for induction into the land or naval forces the Project Director shall issue to him an indefinite leave on Form WRA 137 without prior authorization by the Director. The destination shown on the form shall be the induction center."
