LIQUIDATION OF CANADA PROPERTY TO START SOON

Liquidation of property held by Canadian Japanese on the Pacific coast appeared imminent as warnings were given by Glenn MacPherson, representing the Canadian government's secretary of state and the Custodian's office, that advertisements would appear immediately informing the public that the Japanese properties were for sale.

Meanwhile the Amalgamated Property Owners' Association in Daslo, B.C., was informed by its legal advisors that nothing further could be done to prevent the disposal of this property short of legal action, and was urged to take action as soon as possible in view of the warnings given that liquidation would begin at once.

The association, according to the New Canadian, asked for a speed-up in contributions and prepared to go to court to test the legality of the liquidation procedures.

THIRD RELOCATION FORUM TO BE HELD

The third of the relocation forums sponsored by the relocation committee under Dr. L.C. Bane will be held this Thursday evening at Dining Hall 32 from 8 PM.

Speakers will be Katherine Nakaso, on orientation to outside conditions, and Henry Tani, on assimilation techniques. Bob Iki is scheduled to be moderator.

Beginning this week, all persons relocating on seasonal or indefinite leaves will be required to attend at least one of these forums.

EDITORIAL MORE FARM WORKERS NEEDED

The nation-wide scarcity of food will become very apparent in our dining halls this fall and winter unless Topaz citizens respond immediately to the labor shortage in the Agricultural division.

Because of the short growing season, all of our truck crops must be planted this month. A number of these crops must be planted by June 15 in order to mature before the frost, which usually occurs in September.

The statement that the government will feed us is true, but neither love nor money will buy food or anything else if it isn't available.

The land selected for the truck crops is the best soil on the Project. Valuable stands of alfalfa hay were plowed up in order to prepare the land for vegetables. The land is not first-class truck gardening land, but it is far more productive than many tracts of land farmed by Japanese in California.

Now is the time to remedy a bad situation next fall. The truck gardening section must have 100 more men to carry out its planting program. So let's go to work on the farm and have something to eat next fall besides rutabagas and parsnips.

TUBERCULOSIS FILM SCHEDULED

An educational talkie short on tuberculosis will be shown at the various dining halls this week as an addition to the regular movie program.

Explanations in Japanese on the importance of promoting a public health program in Topaz will be given by Dr. M. Harada at Dining Hall 33 on Thursday evening and by Dr. James Goto at Dining Hall 3 on Friday evening.

The following instructions for relocators were issued by G.V. Morris, evacuee property officer:

1. All prospective relocators must appear at the evacuee property office to arrange for shipment of their personal property at least one week before the date of departure.

2. Unless relocators call personally at Warehouse 121 after their personal property has been picked up, shipment will be delayed.

3. Trunks which are to be shipped via freight at government expense must be crated before being sent to the warehouse. This does not apply to trunks if checked as baggage on your ticket.

4. Baggage that is to be checked on your ticket (suitcases, etc.) should not be sent to the warehouse. The carriers will take care of them.

HEAVY RAINFALL, BUT AVERAGE LOW

Almost as much rainfall was recorded in the first five days of June than during the first five months of the year, according to Jim Kurihara, assistant weather observer.

Up to May 31, 1.35 inches of rain fell in Topaz, while in the first week of June, .99 inch was registered.

However, despite the recent rainfall, this year's average lags far below the normal. To date, only 2.34 inches of rain has fallen in Topaz as compared to the average of 4.16 inches.

5 BEATS 26, 5-3!

Highlighted by the hurling duel between Yuk Sano and Nibby Hashiguchi, undefeated Blk. 5 triumphed over unbeaten Blk. 26, 5-3, Sunday.

Gaining a three point lead over their opponents in the 1st inning 26 appeared to be heading toward the victory road. But 5, paced by the excellent short fielding of Tak Takamoto and the hurling of Yuk Sano, though held for the first three innings, came through with 3 runs in the 4th. Both teams held each other in check throughout the next two innings. Then came the decisive 7th. With 3 all Blk. 5's Mam Hirota and Frank Yamashiro clinched the game with their two runs. 5 then held a determined 26 scoreless, thus winning the game, 5-3.

In an unexpected, unpublicized AA game, Blk. 12 completely overwhelmed Blk. 20, 13-4, last Sunday.
