## IDAHO SEASONAL WORKERS MAY GET PERMANENT JOBS

## OGDEN CAMP CONDITIONS IMPROVE AFTER SURVEYS

Under the plans of the WRA office in Idaho Falls, qualified workers on seasonal leaves in Idaho will be considered for permanent positions in the field for which they are trained, according to W. W. Palmer, relocation supervisor, who was in the project this week.

Heretofore, workers returned to the centers after their seasonal assignments were completed. The new policy provides for indefinite leaves on these permanent jobs, which will be thoroughly investigated by the WRA.

Palmer is compiling a record for his office on evacuee seasonal workers in the Idaho area.
