82 RESIDENTS LEAVE TODAY FOR SEASONAL WORK

Eighty-two persons departed this afternoon for seasonal work in Utah, according to Frank Iino of the relocation office. The group left Delta on two special train coaches.

Fourteen workers left for the California Packing Corporation in Ogden, thirty-five went to the Varney Cannery in Roy, and thirty-three departed for the Robbins Cannery in Ogden.

Iino stated that more seasonal workers will be leaving next month.

SHELLCRAFT CLASS COMMENCES JULY 3

A shellcraft class under the direction of Mrs. Yuriko Noda of the art school staff will commence July 3 at block 41-7-EF. Those who have registered are requested to attend the evening class on that date. The classes will be held Monday and Wednesday evenings and Saturday afternoons.

PROVO AREA HAS LABOR SURPLUS

PROVO--To relieve a temporary surplus of Japanese labor, a portion of the workers will be sent to other areas in Utah where a labor shortage exists, according to Lee R. Taylor of Springville, farm labor supervisor.

From Orem groups of about 25 were sent to Gunnison, Sevier County, and to the Gunnison Sugar Company in Centerfield.

The labor surplus occurred when county labor officials were unable to delay the arrival of 70 Japanese from the Heart Mountain center. The delay was necessary as crops were not ready owing to recent bad weather.

All labor will be returned to Utah county in time for cherry harvests.

In Topaz the relocation office announced that men who had been contracted for work in the Provo area will not leave as scheduled early next month in view of cancellation and delay requests from labor officials there.

SENATOR THOMAS TO INDUCT COUNCIL JULY 25

Senator Elbert D. Thomas, US senator from Utah, will induct the fourth term councilmen to office at ceremonies to be held on July 25, it was learned today.

Senator Thomas is expected to address the councilmen as well as the resident public.

The induction ceremonies will be preceded by a banquet to honor incoming and outgoing councilmen.

It was stated that Senator Thomas has a reputation of being a good friend of Japanese Americans.

HOSP. ADMINISTRATOR

Richard Marstella, former assistant fiscal accountant of the finance section, began work Monday as the new hospital administrator. Marstella succeeds Oscar E. Thomas who left at the beginning of this month for Provo, it was stated.

SGT. HOKAMA, WAR VETERAN VISITS TOPAZ

A member of the famed 100th Infantry and the first nisei veteran of the Italian campaign to visit Topaz, Sgt. Shig Hokama was in the center for the past several days. He visited a friend in block 1, who is formerly of Hawaii, on a convalescent furlough from the Bushnell General Hospital in Brigham City where he has been recuperating from a second wound incurred while in action in Italy. Sgt. Hokama hails from Haina Island, Hawaii.

The eldest of eight children, Sgt. Hokama volunteered for the armed forces 8 months before Pearl Harbor. With the outbreak of war, the 100th Infantry was transferred to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, then later to Camp Shelby.

"In Italy the people are just as nice as they can be, but the sight of hungry children is really pitiful," stated the veteran of his experiences in Italy. He hesitated to discuss details of his war experiences but he showed his interviewer the Purple Heart which he was awarded. Sgt. Hokama also wears an Oak Leaf Cluster which he received for his second wound, and campaign ribbons indicating his parti-

cipation in the Pearl Harbor attack, Pacific Theater and the African-Mediterranean Theater and two bronze stars.

Referring to the treatment given nisei soldiers in hospitals he said, "It gets me sore to hear rumors that the nisei soldiers aren't getting the right kind of treatment at these hospitals. Because they really treat us well. Some of our fellow patients from California have invited us to go visit their state with them--they can't be any nicer."

He admitted that he likes the Islands better and is anxious to get completely well and get back to his family and friends in Hawaii.

JEROME RESIDENTS TO BE TRANSFERRED BY JULY 1

The transfer of 5500 residents of the Jerome Relocation Center in Arkansas to four other relocation centers will be completed by July 1, it was announced at War Relocation Authority headquarters.

The movement of the Jerome residents to the other centers was started on June 6. Twenty-five hundred from Jerome will become residents of the Rohwer Relocation Center which is only 35 miles from Jerome. Two thousand evacuees will move from Jerome to the Gila River project in Arizona. Heart Mountain in Wyoming and Granada in Colorado will each gain 500 new residents from the Jerome closing. These four centers were chosen to receive the Jerome evacuees because of their location and available housing space.

This is the first closing of a WRA center. Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, said recently that no immediate plans have been made to close any more centers. He stated that all centers (except Tule Lake) will be closed within a reasonable time after the War Department determines that military necessity no longer requires the maintenance of the exclusion order.

Many of the members of the appointed staff at Jerome are being transferred to other centers.

TOPAZANS ARRIVE AT CAMP SHELBY

The latest group of inductees assigned to the First Battalion of the 442nd Infantry arrived at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, on June 16 and 17.

MAPS ISSUED TO AID RELOCATORS

A new service to help relocators in finding their way around the city has been initiated by the Chicago District Relocation Office, it was reported today by G. Raymond Booth, manager.

Arrangements have been made with the Chicago Rapid Transit Lines, which operates Chicago's elevated and subway transportation systems, to secure in quantity maps of the city showing all public means of transportation including street cars, motor buses, elevated, and subway.

This map, which also has a large scale detailed map of Chicago's Loop district, is being given to each new arrival in the city. The map shows all close-in suburbs as well as Chicago itself.

JUNIOR 4H CLUB MEMBERS PLANT VICTORY GARDEN

Gaining valuable farming experience as well as helping out in the harvesting of crops on the project farm, a group of 250 Junior 4H Club members have been taking care of a two acre victory garden on the local farm. The average age of the 4H'ers is 13 years.

Among the vegetables being planted in the garden are melons, cantaloupes, and cucumbers. 4,000 tomato plants have also been set. Aside from their work on the garden, the organization sends a group of 20 young farmers to aid in the harvesting on the local farm.

REPORT GIVEN ON FARM PLANTINGS

700 acres of small grain have been planted for livestock feed on the local farm, according to a report from the farm division.

Other crops and the number of acres that were planted are: potatoes, 18; carrots, 5; celery, 4; squash, 22; cucumber, 1; sweet corn, 40; broccoli, 2; cabbage, 4; chard, 6; tomatoes, 17; melons, 38; lettuce, 2; kohlrabi, 2; and beets, 5.

U. & PENNSYLVANIA REVERSES DECISION TO BAR NISEI GIRL

The University of Pennsylvania has reversed its decision to bar Miss Naomi Nakano, Philadelphia-born honor student, from accepting a graduate scholarship at the school, according to information received today.

Miss Nakano, a student at Penn since 1940, was advised by officials of the University to reject the proffered scholarship due to a misunderstanding of governmental regulations regarding the acceptance of Nisei students.

Disapproval of the University's previous decision by campus individuals and organizations, and

widespread interest in the case resulted in immediate clarification of the situation. Applications filed with the Provost Marshal General's Office jointly by Miss Nakano and the University, asking permission for her to continue her studies have been approved.

Miss Nakano has indicated, however, that she will take graduate studies at Bryn Mawr College, one of the five schools which have offered her scholarships. Through an exchange arrangement between the two schools, Miss Nakano will do some of her work at the University of Pennsylvania.
