EVACUEL CONFAB PUBLIC ACCEPTANCE BEST DRAWS TO CLOSE; IN HISTORY, SAYS MYER. AGREEMENTS MADE Overflow Audience Hears Director

The evacues conference in Salt Lake City drew to a close this afternoon as the executive committee met to reach an agreement on policy recommendations of the delegates which they will take back to their respective centers, Chairman Mas Narahara informed Project Director L.T. Hoffman by telephone.
