EVACUEE CONFAB PUBLIC ACCEPTANCE BEST DRAWS TO CLOSE; IN HISTORY, SAYS MYER AGREEMENTS MADE Overflow Audience Hears Director

The evacuee conference in Salt Lake City drew to a close this afternoon as the executive committee met to reach an agreement on policy recommendations of the delegates which they will take back to their respective centers. Chairman Mas. Narahara informed Project Director L.T. Hoffman by telephone.

Ray B. Haight, WRA Relocation Supervisor, telegraphed Hoffman that all delegates were in harmonious accord, having voted unanimously on motions of importance.

Pre-convention meetings were held last Friday and Saturday to consider and consolidate seven documents containing facts and petitions submitted by the centers.

Monday and Tuesday the convention drafted presentation facts and recommendations. Wednesday morning a closed meeting was held with Director Dillon S. Myer. Discussions revolved

Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, addressed an overflow audience of residents in the auditorium last night and told them that public acceptance at the present time for persons of Japanese ancestry is better than it has ever been in the past 40 years.

Nine boys will leave here on March 2 to report for their preinduction physical examinations in Fort Douglas, according to Leighton Dingley, acting for local board #30.

Ordered to report are: Tome Yamada, 39-2-E; Hideo Sakoda, 6-7-D; Nobunki Harry Okada, 23-7-E; Jitsuo Yamamura, 39-5-D; Hitoshi Tsuchida, 9-1-AB; Chuichi Charles Nakao, 30-2-C; Robert Yuichi Onizuka, 39-5-C; Sakaye Frank Onizuka, 39-5-C; and Joseph Shigee Shijo, 39-2-D.

Reiterating the progress and events following the evacuation, Myer gave much credit for the changed attitude of the public to the "dramatic evidence of loyalty" shown by the 13,300 nisei in the service. He said that the formation of the nisei combat team in 1943 and the re-institution of selective service for the nisei in 1944 were the first major steps in showing anti-evacuee groups tangible evidence that their opposition had been groundless.

More than 36,000 evacuees have already relocated to almost every state in the Union, Myer said, in reporting on the progress of the relocation program. With such wide dispersal of persons of Japanese ancestry, more persons now understand their problems, Myer declared.

"There is now going on in the West Coast, the greatest bluffing campaign I have ever seen--especially in the rural communities," he said. "Threats of boycott is an old story but it has never succeeded.

"Some of the people in California have advised, you not to return with all sincerity, that it was not safe for you to go back. Such people are afraid for you because they actually believe the bluffs of anti-evacuee groups, who threaten boycotts but will not participate in any violence. Most of the violent acts are committed by young thoughtless people and drunks."

MYER ANSWERS QUESTIONS, EXPLAINS REASONS FOR CLOSING WRA CENTERS

Q1. Will the government authorities assume the full responsibility for losses of life and property resulting from discriminatory acts and violence?

A. WRA cannot guarantee complete safety for anyone because discrimination will not end with the war. The WRA will do everything in its power to prevent discriminatory acts and if such incidents do happen, it will do everything possible to eliminate them. The assistance and co-operation of the Governor of California and almost all other Pacific Coast officials have promised protection for the returning evacuees.

Q2. Will the WRA take

some steps to eliminate discrimination in granting business licenses? Can the WRA stop illegal detaining of evacuees during travel?

A. WRA will do everything it can to help eliminate discrimination in granting business licenses and where there are cases of discrimination WRA will support persons who bring these cases to court. WRA will give the same help and support to those who may be detained illegally.

Q3. The WRA announced its policy of closing the center. There are many families who were uprooted from their businesses and homes and have lost their properties at the time of

HOOD RIVER NISEI KILLED IN ACTION IN PACIFIC

US Army Pacific HQ, Frank T. Hachiya, 25, of Portland, Ore., one of 16 Japanese Americans whose names have been stricken from the county memorial roll by the Hood River, Ore., American Legion, died while performing a dangerous volunteer mission, the army reported last week. Hachiya, attached to the 7th Division, was fatally wounded on Leyte, Dec. 30.

He died Jan. 3 after most of the men in his regiment volunteered to give him blood transfusions. Hachiya volunteered to cross a valley under Japanese fire to scout an enemy position.

evacuation and consequently those who have many dependents have no means of supporting themselves. Can you grant our request that we may be able to stay in the center until that time we can see our way clear? Will you grant our request so that the schools will be maintained until we can relocate?

A. Neither the schools nor the centers will be kept open longer than announced before. The reasons for closing centers are: 1. There are 18,000 to 20,000 youngsters in schools whose education in the center's schools are not sufficient for them to become good citizens—they must live a normal life on the outside. The longer their departure from here is postponed the harder it will be. 2. With the manpower situation as it is now, there is work for all willing and able bodied persons. This may not be the case after the war when competition for jobs will be keener. 3. Plans have been made for those who need assistance in relocating and most welfare agencies are in a better position now to help evacuees than they will be after the war. 4. Justification for the continuance of the centers for requesting appropriations from Congress cannot be made. 5. Anti-evacuee groups want centers maintained so that they can be a target for prejudice and attacks and so that their own economic statuses will not be disturbed by returning evacuees.

In his address before the high school assembly on Friday morning, Dillon S. Myer stated that he was proud of the fine co-operation and efforts that the students and faculties in the nine relocation centers have shown in building a high standard of education.

He emphasized that students should not confine themselves to the relocation centers but should readjust themselves in normal communities, schools and organizations outside of the centers.

"Many of the Nisei have gone out to live a normal American life without fear", Myer told the assembly. "Without fear you can become assimilated in outside communities and thus help to make my job and your part in relocation smooth."

Myer said that the school age children who have been confined in centers for the past three years are his chief concern and that they must be helped back into normal society as soon as possible.

(Continued from page 1) telephone conversation yesterday at 6 o'clock with Robert Cozzens of the San Francisco WPA and said that there had been no acts of violence or incidents in the bay area. He said that it had been reported to the contrary by many returnees themselves who said that they had been welcomed back. Cozzens stated that the housing situation was difficult but so far all those returning to the bay region had found homes.

Governor Warren of California was complimented for his present attitude towards the return of evacuees. "I want to say to you that the governor of California and a lot of other officials have rolled up their sleeves and have decided that they are going to do this job

right," the director said.

"The governor has made a statement of what the people of California should do but that isn't all, he has followed it up in deed and action on every turn. I was critical of him in the past, but I can pat him on the back now because he is doing his job.

"Most of you are free to go now any place you want to go in the country and we want to help in any way we know how within the limits of our authority. We have about 11 months now in which we can work with you in planning this job. WRA has made plans—the thing that needs to be worked out now is to have you make plans. This job can be done with the spirit of co-operation with which we have worked in the past," Myer stated.
