let cliannel. The Boouf River main will flow four and a half miles east of the Center residential aroa.

Previous to work on the Beouf River main, the nisei cleared four miles of heavy tree growth and debris from the Beouf river into which the waters from the manmade waterways will flow.

Big bayou and Crooked bayou, both in the Project area, will also be cleared and redredged since heavy tree growth and bars of sediment have reduced the flow to 50 per cent capacity.

Actual work on the project was started Oct. 15 by crew of engineers began dlearing the river two weeks later.
