LET'S BUY SEALS

COUNCIL EVACUEES URGED TO COMPLY WITH OR SELECTIVE SERVICE REGULATION

Evacuees ·of draft age who are subject to Selective Service laws we a reminded today of their responsibility for keeping in touch with their draft bourds. according to special instructions received from Juchington. Lule residents of Colorado River Relocation center were warned that failure to comply with draft regulations would automatically make them draft delinquents and subject them to possible criminal prosecution.

Under the Selective Service and Training act of 1940, as amended, all persons between the ages of 18 and 45 who are required to register with a local draft board must inform local boards at all times of any charge of address, dependency, or merital status.

The regulation with respect to change of address apparently to evaluate who relocate and settle elsewhere. As soon as relocation has been affected, evaluate must write to their draft

boards, indicating their new address, the type of job, and current marital and dependency status. Each time an evacuee moves, the same procedure must be followed.

Young men reaching their 18th birthday aro required by law to rerister at once with the neurest belective Service Board. Evacuees should contact the unit administrators, have been appointed by Jumes D. Grauford, Selective service reprebentative for the Yuna County Board, to assist them in registering. If relocated, evacueus must register, at the neurast local draft boui'd.

It was also disclosed today that some ovaounce have as yet fail ed to notify their loout boards of their project address. Residents who have so far harlested to comply with any of the above to contact are least at torney Tallsas in order that their records oun be brought up to dute immediately.
