

## UNIT 3 COUNCIL EVACUEES URGED TO COMPLY WITH ASKS FOR SELECTIVE SERVICE REGULATION COP UNIFORMS

At the regular Unit III council meeting held Wednesday afternoon, the motion was made and approved to make a request to the WRA for complete police uniforms in Unit III.

Announcement of receipt of \$51.91 from the Gering Department for the month of November was made by the Council Chairman.

A memo from Wade Head, Project Director, regarding Boris Burge and his new position as Liaison Officer between Units Administrator was announced.

## ZIMMERMAN IN KALAMAZOO

Giles L. Zimmerman, former chief of the employment division, left last Thursday for Kalamazoo, Michigan with his wife and child, after receiving notice from the National Service Board of his assignment to the Civilian Public Service.

Mr. Zimmerman arrived in the center in March, 1943, succeeding Vernon L. Kennedy as chief of employment on April 1.

LET'S BUY SEALS

Evacuees of draft age who are subject to Selective Service laws were reminded today of their responsibility for keeping in touch with their draft boards, according to special instructions received from Washington. Male residents of Colorado River Relocation center were warned that failure to comply with draft regulations would automatically make them draft delinquents and subject them to possible criminal prosecution.

Under the Selective Service and Training Act of 1940, as amended, all persons between the ages of 18 and 45 who are required to register with a local draft board must inform local boards at all times of any change of address, dependency, or marital status.

The regulation with respect to change of address applies especially to evacuees who relocate and settle elsewhere. As soon as relocation has been effected, evacuees must write to their draft

boards, indicating their new address, the type of job, and current marital and dependency status. Each time an evacuee moves, the same procedure must be followed.

Young men reaching their 18th birthday are required by law to register at once with the nearest Selective Service Board. Evacuees should contact the unit administrators, who have been appointed by James D. Crawford, Selective Service representative for the Yuma County Board, to assist them in registering. If relocated, evacuees must register at the nearest local draft board.

It was also disclosed today that some evacuees have as yet failed to notify their local boards of their project address. Residents who have so far neglected to comply with any of the above regulations are urged to contact project attorney Ted Hahn in order that their records can be brought up to date immediately.
