Carey McWilliams Writes New Book on Japanese Americans

Tells History of West Coast Prejudice

PREJUDICE, the new book by Carey McWilliams is subtitled "Japanese American Symbol of Racial Intolerance" and tells the history of West Coast discrimination against the Japanese, which began when imported Japanese laborers began to become small owners and reached a major climax when evacuation was ordered.

"For perhaps the first time in our national history, the federal government has singled out for particularly harsh treatment a section of our population and has based the discrimination solely on racial grounds," McWilliams has written. But he believes that because the "Nisei have met the test of their loyalty in magnificent manner under the most trying circumstances," they "will in the long run finally remove those long-standing doubts and misgivings."

November Will See Reduction in Cost of Money Orders

* * *
Reduction in money order, insurance and C.O.D. fees and an increase in minimum special delivery fees has been announced by Postmaster Clarence Johnson. The new fees will be effective November 1.

Money order fees will drop back to what they were previous to the price increase last March. New fees are as follows:

Up to \$2.50-- .06; up to \$5-- .09; up to \$10-- .11; up to \$20-- .13; up to \$40-- .15; up to \$60-- .18; up to \$80-- .20; up to \$100-- .22.

Insured mail fees will drop far below what they were before the increase last spring. They are:

Up to \$5-- .03 from .10; up to \$25-- .10 (cont. on city page)

All Tooele Workers under War Manpower Stabilization Agreement

No Distinction Made Because of Ancestry

Workers at the Tooele Ordnance Depot are covered by War Manpower Stabilization Agreement regardless of race or nationality. Otis Peterson, Salt Lake City relocation supervisor said this week.

Peterson conferred with Depot and War Manpower Commission officials concerning the stabilization program and was assured that there was no distinction made between persons of Japanese ancestry and other individuals working at the depots. "It is simply a matter," he said, "of living up to the War Manpower Stabilization Agreement under which all persons working in essen-

FIRST ANTI-ALIEN LAND LAW CASE WON BY STATE

California, winning the first anti-Oriental land ownership law case, will receive the 30 acres of land held in the name of Hidenori Asano, a Japanese American, according to a Superior Court decision last month, the Open Forum reported on Oct. 21.

It was alleged that the land was actually owned by Kiyoshi Watanabe, an alien, but had been deeded in the name of his son-in-law, Asano, to escape the provision of the land act.

tial industry are expected to remain on the job unless their skills can be utilized on work having a higher priority. The Provost Marshal General's office is solely concerned with clearance

of evacuees and any stabilization at the depot is under the direction of the War Manpower Commission.

Peterson explained that evacuees who accept work at the depot should accept it in a spirit of contributing to the war effort and remaining on the job as long as is necessary. However, if they have legitimate reasons for release, such as failing health or important personal matters, the WMC and the Depot will give every consideration in providing a certificate of availability which will permit the evacuee to work elsewhere.

NAVY MEN IN UNIT III VISITED BY OLD NAVY FRIENDS; SERVED TOGETHER UNDER ROOSEVELT I

Two Navy men, Capt. R.C. MacFall and Chief Yeoman D. D. Lore, visited Charles Arata and Iwakichi Kanasawa, of "Block 322, Unit III, last Thursday afternoon, and the four men "chewed the rag," recalling old Navy experiences.

All four were members of the Great White Fleet which in 1908, when Teddy Roosevelt was president, made a globe-circling cruise. They were on different ships, however.

Registered and unregistered C.O.D. fees will also be decreased, and the only increase in prices will be in special delivery fees, where first class mail up to 2 lbs. will rise from .10 to .13, and second, third, and fourth class mail up to 2 lbs. will go up from .15 to .17.

Student relocation counselors here have recently received letters from the Fair Play Committee representative of the YMCA, University of California at Berkeley, offering the services of that group to students who wish to go to California to study, according to Estelee Hinson, Unit I student relocation counselor.

Catalogues of California colleges and junior colleges are being received by the counselors. Interested students are asked to confer with the counselors, Miss Hinson and Ben Sanematsu in I, Mary Courage in II and Martha Hayes in III, and to begin making plans for student relocation several months before the time they wish to leave the center.

ALMOST 3,000 STUDENTS HELPED IN RELOCATING TO OUTSIDE SCHOOLS

The National Japanese American Student Relocation Council, which was set up for the purpose of assisting students to continue their education in schools outside the evacuated areas, feels that the main purpose of its existence has been accomplished with the opening up of a representative group of schools, according to John H. Provinse, acting WRA director.

Therefore, it has been decided that the continuing program should be primarily the responsibility of the WRA schools, as is true of other secondary schools, the center relocation divisions and relocation field officers, for the placement of project senior students in institutions of higher learning.

At the time of evacuation, approximately 2,500 Japanese American students were enrolled in educational institutions in the restricted zones. Now, there are between 2,500 and 3,000 students attending approximately 500 schools in various parts of the U.S. Recent removal of the PMGO clearance requirement for attendance and employment at educational institutions important to the war effort was another step forward in this program.
