

## MILK BOTTLES TO MESS HALL

"Starting immediately no person will be admitted to a mess hall unless he has the proper matching button."

As soon as the Center is entirely filled, he added, there may be some redistribution of mess buttons so that everyone may eat nearest to his barrack.

"The mess division will appreciate the cooperation of the people in this plan," Brewster said.

All half-pint milk bottles taken from the mess halls should be returned to the mess halls and not to the milk stations, it was requested, as there is no facility for handling empty milk bottles in the milk stations.
