ISSUE CLOTHES

CASH GOES TO RESIDENTS

Distribution of the WRA clothing allotment to each individual of the Center will "begin on or about November 15" according to Henry Halliday, administrative officer.

The exact date will depend upon the completion of payroll accounting for August and September. Payments for August begin next week.

Allotments will be usually made in cash though in some instances new clothing will be issued.

WORKERS TO GET APPAREL

Special clothing is to be issued next week to garbage collectors, truck drivers, farm laborers and others who work out of doors, Ralph Mitchell, property officer, revealed.

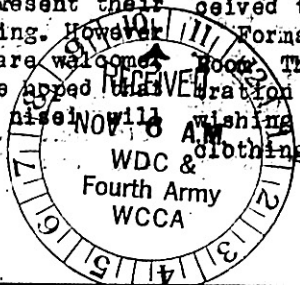
The type of clothing distributed depends upon the nature of the job. The approval of the department head is required before individuals get them.

Overcoats, jackets, pants, overalls, and gloves are to be given out. This distribution is not to be confused with the WRA clothing allotment, Mitchell said.

Special grants of extra clothing will be made to needy families following an investigation according to instructions received from the Social welfare department. This will have no bearing on garments received through the WRA.

Forms are available at Room Three South Administration Building, for those wishing special types of clothing not listed.

BAN SALE OF LIQUOR

No firewater for Amache Japanese!

The Lamar city council has passed a resolution prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor to residents of the WRA Project.

Ordinance 320 specifies that the owner of any liquor store or restaurant violating the ordinance shall be subject to cancellation of his license.

Any person confined and at liberty temporary within the city of Lamar, who purchases intoxicating liquor will be arrested and if convicted will be delivered to WRA authorities for such action as they may determine.

The prohibition became effective Oct. 10.

Thumbnail SKETCHES

Into the personality parade steps Toshio Shoji, one of the many Project timekeepers, better known to his close friends as "Skylark."

For the past two years, Toshio was doing his share in the war effort as the foreman of final assembly inspection at the Skylark Manufacturing company in Venice, Calif.

This plant is a subsidiary of the Vultee Aviation company, makers of the famous Vultee Vengeance dive bombers used by the US air force.

During his leisure time, Shoji repaired planes at the Metropolitan airport in Los Angeles. There he worked on planes owned by such stars as Tyrone Power, Richard Arlen, and Jean Parker.

"My sole interest in visiting this Center is to help the residents relocate themselves in various sections of Colorado," stated James Omura, who interviewed more than a 100 applicants for jobs outside the Project.

Omura, who is the director of the Pacific Coast Evacuee Placement bureau, left for Denver Tuesday to make final arrangements to place girls wishing to obtain jobs in private homes.

"At the present, most calls from employers are for housework, paying the current wages of \$40 to \$50 per month. This is just a starter and we are making every effort to broaden the scope of employment," he explained.
