MESS & LODGING

OLD PASSES VOID

Beginning with supper tomorrow (Thursday) all Special Passes on grey-colored Parcel Check Tags will be cancelled, according to Mr. L. C. Shaffer, Supervisor of Mess and Lodging.

Why this change?

"One reason is that several persons who are no longer working are making use of the passes. Another reason is that everything is operating smoothly now--and we feel that only in emergency cases are special passes necessary," commented Shaffer.

New passes will be issued only to those individuals whose duties prevent their attendance at regular meal hours. Any requests for new passes must be made directly to the Division Heads.

Also, with the effective date of this notice, all persons not holding new passes will be required to eat at their own respective Mess Halls.

Last night, the story ended beautifully but what of the plot that is laid for us? Will individual selfishness and group cliqueness pave a way to our disintegration? Shall our heritage be lost on the divergent paths of self-interest?

Johnny Nisei, representative of all of us, is the doctor and upon him will depend the course and consequences.

CENTER PREPARES; TRUNKS, CLOTHES ARRIVAL INCREASES

Signs of preparation for relocation have been prevalent the last two weeks as trunks, sewing machines, ironing boards, baby high chairs and other equipment are coming through the Police Inspection Office.

With the printing of fall order books, Center-ites are ordering clothing at a high rate.

Sewing machines have been coming in at the rate of four a day for the past two weeks; the heavy trunks, 12 a day.

LIBRARY PROVES WORTH

"During the last three months the Center Library has been a huge success. We should like to make the library in the relocation area equally successful," declared Ken Hasegawa, head librarian of the Center Library.

Statistics back up his statement. In July: 5,625 books and 912 magazines were checked out to 12,132 Center-ites. In August: 2,578 books and 712 magazines were loaned to 10,759 readers.

Light fiction, mystery and westerns are at the top of the ladder for popularity. Next come: biographies, travel books and current topics.

Also in the favor of Center-ites is the group of latest fiction and non-fiction which comes in every Wednesday afternoon from the Stockton Public Library. Through this

channel Center-ites have their opportunity of requesting any desirable books.

"Dragon Seed," by Pearl S. Buck; "The Sun Is My Undoing," by Marguerite Steen and "All This and Heaven, Too," by Rachel Field hold top popularity honors in specific books. A long waiting list is hopefully attached to each.

"We should like to ask Center-ites, who have loose books or magazines which make luggage too cumbersome or which are no longer wanted, to donate or lend them to the Library," requested the head librarian.

RAMBLING REPORTER EDUCATION and RELOCATION

The Center residents answered the question, "Along educational lines, what important points do you feel should be emphasized at relocation?" in the following manner.

MAEEL MIYAGISHIMA, Pers. Dept.: "Well-qualified teachers. Subjects more concerned with development of child character should receive proper emphasis."

WALTER FURUMACHI, Senior Timeskeeper (36): "Knowledge of cooperative system of living should be included in school curriculum. Sufficient facilities to give proper vocational training."

JOHN SHIIMAKAWA, Scoutmaster (29): "Education must be carried out in similar fashion as the California public schools. Need for qualified teachers, Caucasian or Nisei."

H. YUKAWA of S.F. (50): "Too much recreation here. Education must be the principal occupation of children at relocation. Compulsory high school training is needed."

EARL HIRANO (29): "Trade or vocational schools should be instituted for older Nisei. Must prepare for the future."

TOSHIO KANEDA, Adult Education (24): "Administration, competent instructors, planning, up-to-date materials, flexible curriculum--all these must be adequate."

ICHIRO NAKAHARA (24): "Agricultural education should be included--farm mechanics and scientific methods. Marketing knowledge is essential, too."

ROGAN MIYANISHI, Mess Dept. (39): "Night school classes for older folks besides the regular school system would help. Many enrollees here have benefited by them."

MR. RALPH MILLET, Finance Supt.: "A diversified educational system which would enable everyone to participate and prepare them for the readjustment period after the war, resulting in better knowledge of problems that are sure to confront every one is necessary. Education must keep pace with the many developments taking place outside of relocation areas."

In charge of all inventory records for expendable items except food stuffs, and postings and reconciliations of inventory reports from the various divisions with the inventory cards is Alice Ohashi.
