ADVANCE CREW GO 250 VOLUNTEERS TO START HEGIRA MON

DR. SASAKI, STAFF WILL ESCORT GROUP

As an aftermath of the relocation news released on Thursday, 50 more persons--additional workers and members of the families of volunteer workers--applied with Chief of Personal Accounts, Roland Frost, yesterday to leave with the original 200 workers on Monday, September 14 for the new War Relocation Project in answer, Arkansas, in Desha County about 2000 miles and four days' ride away.

The medical staff accompanying the workers will consist of Dr. George Sasaki, Dr. Masaki Yyoshi and his family, Dr. Kenji Oshidari, dentist, Mureo Chitose Aihara, Nurse Mary Hashimoto and her husband, Calvin, and Dietician Yoshiko Konzo.

The advance crew will include 10 hospital attendants, 15 hospital maids, 1 hospital clerk, 10 cooks, 10 cook's helpers, 10 dish-washers, 20 waiters, 1 butcher, 2 bakers, 1 store manager, 2 retail clerks, 4 recreational leaders, 1 social worker, 2 carpenters, 1 electrician, 1 plumber, 10 stenotypists, 5 clerks, 10 guides, 10 truck drivers, 70 laborers and the additional 50 late applicants.

Jim Doi, leaving as a volunteer, will act as EL JOAQUIN's special correspondent.

AUG. PAYCHECKS

"August pay checks may be a few days late due to the confusion caused by the pending departure of the advance crew for Arkansas and the leaving of the Montana beet workers," remarked Mr. Roland Frost, Supervisor of the Personal Records Division.

"But still, we may be able to get them out in time for distribution sometime next week," he added, "though we're pretty busy signing up volunteers, recording transfers and filling in work vacancies."

"ADDRESS LETTERS OR ELSE" JACOBS

Effective immediately all letters which are not properly return-addressed will not be mailed but returned to the sender. Senders of letters must have on the left upper corner of the envelope their name, address--block, bur-rack, apartment--location, city and state. This action is taken for the benefit of the residents of the center, since after evacuation letters improperly return addressed will be sent directly to the dead letter office instead of being forwarded to the relocation center. All letters mailed at the center without any return addresses will immediately be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Last Wednesday night, the final Court of Honor for the Boy Scouts held in the grandstand highlighted as well as culminated the major scouting function in this Center.

Over 2000 residents attended the affair which saw the presentation of numerous merit badges and class awards and the presence of several well-known San Joaquin County Scout commissioners.

Nisei all, these 125 Scouts visibly represented the Americanization of the American-born Japanese. Through scouting, they have trained for the purpose of instilling themselves with the American way of thinking; they have begun to understand the liberty that we cherish and the freedom that our nation has always fought for.

As the Americans of the present and future, the healthy slant on life that is theirs will prove invaluable.

Exemplifying indomitable unselfishness, they deserve the support of the Center people. Expenses for the Court of Honor, for the awards, and for the various scouting activities have resulted in a deficit of about a hundred dollars. Thus, the Scouts are in need of funds.

In the past, it has been the Issei who have borne the brunt of contribution for most of the community functions and too often the Nisei have shirked economic aid to our clubs and community chests while we were not adamant of spending our money for our own pleasures.

In a few days, an active campaign to set up funds for the Scouts will be initiated. Since it is the Nisei who, today, comprise the bulk of the Center's wage-earners, it would be a fine gesture on our part to back these Nisei Scouts by subscribing a dollar toward their chests.

A dollar given by every working Nisei would net over 3-400 dollars and would prove to the Issei that we have enough gumption to give and that we have the proper spirit of cooperation which we need now more than ever before.

Must the Scouts turn to the Issei or will the Nisei accept this challenge and constructively share the burden that brings benefits to our entire center.

Trickling streams of people carrying their own chairs began to assemble at vantage points in front of the grandstand in order that they may gain better views of the movies to be shown.

The eastern clouds are now purple-grey and burgundy and sharply contrasted the June rose hue dominating the west. With darkening moments, the cinema-attenders increased in numbers till they filled out a sizeable portion of the track.

Scampering children, giggling and talking, and seriously intent boys, playing 'five hundred' and 'bridge', created a happy-go-lucky scene. It seemed that they did not have a problem on their mind.

Yet they were "The Problem People" as stated in one of the August issues of the Collier's Magazine. They or, rather, we are a part of the 115,000 migrants who have been moved out of our coastal homes and who are to be sent further inland away from the possible areas of conflagration.

Seemingly carefree and without worries, the Nisei in America have much to think about.

To the Issei, there are the problems that accompany any family groups -- the concern over the education, the home-life, the physical development, and the uncertain future of their children.

MESS AND LODGING DEPT.

The Mess and Lodging Dept. is credited to the mess foremen headed by George Tanaka and assisted by Hagan Liyanishi and Jack Sawada. Their duty is to have enough mess hall workers, to help settle all problems and to take all complaints.
