### HISTORY OF CAMPSITE TOLD IN BRIEF

The Japanese Assembly Center used to be the site of the annual Tulare-Kings Counties Fair until last March, at which time the Army leased it from the Tulare-Kings Counties Fair Association for the purpose of resettling evacuated Japanese from prohibited areas.

At that time there were horse racing, live stock and poultry judging and exhibits of fresh produce.

On March 25, contractor Robert H. Houghan, of Hanford came to start construction. During construction, a varied number of people worked and barrack were set up at the rate of one every forty-five minutes.

On the sixty acre grounds, there are 171 barracks, 21 baths, 11 mess houses, 30 latrines, 3 hospitals, and 5 laundries. The different sections are alphabetically placed and divided into section, unit and barrack number.

### FIVE THOUSAND JAPANESE EVACUEES TO BE HOUSED IN TULARE CAMP

According to our camp manager, Mr. Nils Annonson, there will be approximately 5000 persons housed here. There are about 2400 people here now, and the rest are due starting today.

Although complete figures are not available on incoming evacuees, the following is the correct data on those already here. From Santa Barbara, Mr. Taki Asakura reported 80 families with approximately 300 people and 20 single men. 375 people came from Santa Maria and 800 from Guadalupe. These two communities combined have 410 families according to Mr. Harry Miyake.

From the Arroyo Grande district, James Nakamura reported 35 families, consisting of 150 people. Tokoshi Kasamatsu of the Lompoc district says that there are 29 families with 138 people. Of the 216 families consisting of 969 people, 65 are single men from the Ventura district, stated Helen Kimura.

The center is made up from two pieces of ground, the Tulare-Kings Counties Fair ground and the County Hospital Grounds.

There are two water pumping plants with 15,000 Gallons High pressure water systems, from which comes all the camp water supply. In addition to this, there are four-inch and six-inch water lines which comes from the city of Tulare for the fire fighting system.

During the construction period the water and sewage systems were put in and also one mile of outside sewage system had to be installed.

A postoffice and mail-carrying system was established. As yet no Government has been definitely formed, but the foundation will be made soon.

EFFECTS OF TYPHOID  
SHOTS TOLD

In an effort to counteract the typhoid disease, every person in the Tulare Assembly Center was subject to the first compulsory typhoid inoculation which was given by the hospital staff on Monday and Tuesday.

Typhoid shots will be repeated for two more times which will be given during the interval of five days. If a person has taken this injection before a certificate must be presented. Effects are as follows: aches, chills, general run-down conditions and headaches, for which aspirin will be supplied by the hospital to persons needing them.

Small pox immunization was also given to everyone excepting those under four years of age who show their small pox scars. Drs. Watanebe, Suenaga, and Takeno were in charge.

### GIGANTIC ASSEMBLY CENTER RECREATIONAL PROGRAM SET

With the erecting of a volleyball net last Tuesday in front of the Information Office, the first step toward organizing a gigantic recreational program for the Takara-Kings County Assembly Center was underway.

According to Joe Nakayama, temporary director of recreation four other volleyball nets were being put in use when the paper went to press.

Under clubs and organizations, red cross work, first aid, social service, art classes and glee club will be formed.
