STUMP HAS COLORFUL CAREER

PIXLEY SPEAKS OF H.P. STUMP

Harwood P. Stump, director of the Service Division here, who left for the Army Induction station at Santa Rosa, last night has had a short but very active civilian life. Stump, who is a selectee, will start army life as a back private.

Born in the Clark Mills in Missouri on October 11, 1908, he spent the first ten years of his life on a farm. At this time, he moved to Long Beach, California. At this time, he moved to Long Beach, California with his family, and still claims that city as his home. His parents are still there.

He attended Long Beach Poly High School and graduated in 1933 with a B. A. degree in political science. From J.C. he went to U.C.D.A. and graduated in 1933 with a B. A. degree in political science. He was active in all school functions, his outstanding achievement was the winning of a national championship in oratory at a Phi Kappa Delta (honorary speakers' fraternity) convention at Oklahoma in 1932. He also won two other sectional championships in that year.

After his graduation, he worked in a gold mining camp as a cook for three dollars a day, and according to him, he "poisoned" them for about six months. After his cooking experience, he went into social work for two and a half years.

At this time, he began working for the Federal Government as an administrative officer doing personnel work. This work took him all over the state of California, including places such as Santa Rosa, Humboldt, and Eureka. He was engaged in this work until he was transferred as director of the Service Division here.

Not satisfied with just working, he engaged in many extra-curricular activities. A Scoutmaster for six years, he has earned a Scoutmaster's key, a high achievement award, as well as being director of Camp Takahiti, a Boy Scout camp in the San Jacinto mountains. He took teaching in his stride, having taught Americanization and history classes in C.C.C. camps and adolescent science at Humboldt State Teachers College.

A Methodist, he taught Sunday School for six years, and was the Supervisor of the Young People in the Santa Rosa Methodist Church for two years.

A born leader, Stump was the first president of the Humboldt Council of Social Agencies, and general chairman of a California convention of social workers in 1940. He has spoken before all kinds of organizations, and was a member of the Long Beach 20-30 club and the Eureka Kiwanis Club.

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The Works Division wishes to bid adieu to Mr. Harwood P. Stump, Supervisor of the Service Division. We also desire to extend our sincere thanks for the splendid cooperation he has given us in making this Center a pleasant place in which to live.

It has been a great pleasure to know and work with him and to watch his unswerving efforts to bring about swift completion of every project he has undertaken. We will miss him greatly, but we know that Uncle Sam is fortunate indeed to obtain the services of one who will devote his physical and mental abilities as unstintingly to his new task as he has done in the past at the Tulare Assembly Center.

We are in hopes that the officers under whom he serves will issue as many orders marked "immediately", "urgent", "now", "expedite", "rush", as he has issued to the Works Division in the past.

MAINTENANCE DIVISION BUSY

To climax the all day program on July 4th, a Factory Dance will be held from 8:30 to 10:30 on a platform in the K unit with a display of lights! Names of the chaperons for the evening will be announced at a later date.

Many improvements are underway throughout the Center by the hard working crew of the Works and Maintenance Department who diligently labor to better the place for everyone.

With Supervisor E. E. Pixley and Commissioner George Asakura in charge, workers are constructing the new clothes line brackets which will be extended from one end of the barrack to the other on the 2 x 4 wood overhanging the roof. Each respective unit must furnish their own wire of rope for the line.

The problem of flies and insects coming into the barracks will be partially solved by the galvanized screens on all the windows. Completion of this work will take another week or two before the entire Center is covered.

Approximately \$5,000 was used to meet the expenses of screening.

Cleaner and neater mess tables will be observed as residents go in for their meals. Masonite tops have been provided for the ten mess halls at a cost of about \$450. These were purchased at the Spaulding Lumber Company in Visalia.

Additional fifty fly traps will also be made. This will allow for more sanitary conditions in the kitchens.

Under construction in the recreational softball diamonds are two back stops. At present, only the framework has been finished. An inner fence will be built to prevent balls from entering the fence next to the road. Only the men patrolling their particular area will be allowed to pick up stray balls.

Women's toilets will be partitioned sometime next week, according to Asakura.

AANONSEN APPROVES NEW CONSTITUTION BY COUNCIL

The new Tulare Assembly Center Constitution was officially approved by Center Manager Nils Aanonsen Wednesday, June 24, and went into effect as of that day.

The Constitution was drawn up by a special committee appointed by the Council, and was accepted by that body. It was then sent up to the Center Commission, and ratified, before being submitted to

Aanonsen for his approval.

Aanonsen stated that he was well satisfied with the document, and complimented the Council on their fine job. The new Constitution automatically supercedes the old Constitution, which was drawn up temporarily by the Provisional Council, now replaced by the elected body, and will govern the conduct of the residents of this Center hereafter.

CANTEEN REMODELED

The remodeling of the Center canteen, E-2, will be completed by July 1, revealed Don Turpin, Center Exchange executive. The canteen, similar to the L-7 store, will be so constructed that the people will purchase from the north and south aisles. Window counters will be widened to eight feet, as well as being covered for the benefit of little children. Awnings will be erected to provide shade for the customers.

Stack rooms will be located on both ends of the barrack, with the office at the east end and the canteen in the center. Eight more clerks

were added to both canteens which make the total number of employees to 21. They are: Mary Toyoda, Shizuo Kido, Miyoko Kido, Ruby Kirita, Annie Fujimoto, Miss Kondo, Sachiko Egami and Harry Hasogawa.

The Times and Examiners will be sold daily including Sunday on schedule from 8:30 in the morning. Dry cleaning will be picked up from 2:30 to 3:30 in the afternoons each day.
