

In December, 1941, when exploding bombs and gunfires flared in strange-sounding places, such as Mindanao, Luson, Corregidor, Bataan, the name "Douglas MacArthur" flashed into the headlines of every paper in the land. The dauntless defender of Bataan! The Supreme Commander in the Southwest Pacific! A first class fighting man! Such designations referred to

none other than General MacArthur.

His transfer to Australia as Supreme Commander of the United Nations' Armed Forces in the Southwest Pacific may be considered the climax of General Mac-Arthur's colorful military career. In his past exciting sixty-two years he has heard the zing of Indian the crack of Moxican rifles on the plateau arrows, the crack of Mexican Files on the sabove Vera Cruz, the thunder of artillery and the burst of shrappel in the Argonne Forest, the whir of Filipino bolos, and finally the present explosions of Japanese bombs. MacArthur's first recollection is the martial sound of bugles in Little Rock, Arkansas, where he was born on January 26, 1880.

HIGHEST RECORD IN TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

Douglas MacArthur's life is full of firsts, bests

and onlys. He entered Westpoint in 1899 and as a yearling he won the rank of first corporal; as a second classman he became ranking first sergeant; as a first classman he became first captain; as a graduate in 1903 he stood at the head of his class with a re-

cord that was the highest in twenty-five years.

After his graduation MacArthur has enjoyed a series of promotions from one rank to another. In 1904 and 1906 during the Russo-Japanese War he served as military aide to his father in Tokyo, Japan. Ho traveled in the Orient on a confidential mission. Makden he saw the Japanese soldiers charge a Russianheld hill six times and joined them on the seventh successful attack. As an observer with the Japanese army, he acquired a good knowledge of Japanese mili-

General Douglas MacArthur

When the United Stated entered World War I, Macaren sailed to France with the Mainbow Division, which he had formed. Come on the battle field, courage was his outstanding characteristic. Disdaining helmet, gas mask and side-arms, he went with his mes into No Man's Land. Arrend with only a riding erop, he brought back eight Jerman prisoners.

He has been decorated by twelve foreign governments. Among his array of rolels his the P.S.C., the D.S.M., the Purple Heart (all with oak-leaf cluster), the Silver Star with six cas-leaf clusters, Grand Officer Legion of Honor, Groix de Guerra with throe

palms, and many others.

YOUNGEST COMMANDANT AND CHIEF OF STAFF Returning from Europe in 1918, MicArthur received the position of superintendent of Westpoint Military Acadomy, only sixteen years after his own graduation there. Thus he was the youngest commandant in Westpoint history.

Nie great promotion came in November, 1950, whom President Recover gave him the title, Chief of Steff. At the age of fifty, MacArthur, the youngest chief of staff in the Army's history, inherited an outmoded American army. The post-ear depression had out down appropriations, but MacArthur fought against odds to get funds for the modernization of the United States

In the fall of 1935 when his term as Chief of Staff came to an end, MacArthur was off to the Philippines, heading the American military mission to oriprime, meaning of the seas. When President Queson asked him to act as military sovier to the newsy formed Commomwealth of the Philippines, MacArchur accepted almost immediately, for his fundaces for the filipines was lifeking and germine. He received the title of Field Marshall and was again faced with the structle of setting money for men and equipment. Despite obstacles, he releatlessly persisted on the thesis that the Philippines could be defended and he made his plane and preparations accordingly.

before his program was helf completed, however, the Japanese troops moved into Chailand. The fast mounting crisis was coming to a peak. On July 26, 1941, President Hoosevelt struck a blow in the Pacific by appointing Douglas Bacarthur Commenting General of the United States Armed Perces in the Far East.

Allotment of \$70,000. 000 approved by the House for the War Relocation Authority was made for the year starting July 1. The WRA disclosed that among the people now being relocated, two-thirds are American born, 30,000 under 14, and the main issue involves "questions of mational security and the problem of enabling tine evacuees to make a living, protect their health, and continuo the education of children."

Statistics roveal that approximately 80,000 are new in temperary Assembly Centers, 20,000 are in permanent relocation areas, 10.000 to 15,000 have been "frozen" in Eastern California preparatory to ovacuation, while still others are awaiting voluntary relocation admission to Centers.
