EVACUATION

FOODS REQUIRING COOKING PROHIBITED
Federal regulations prohibit the possession and the serving of foods which require heating or cooking in the quarters of the evacuees, though it does not apply to the preparation and heating of formula food for infants, was announced by C. R. Carter, Supervisor of the Service Division.

Foods requiring heating will be confiscated without compensation by the Interior Police when delivered to the Center, in accordance with the regulation. This will go into effect Monday morning, July 27.

Centers Not Affected by Order

Final orders for the evacuation of all Japanese from California areas outside of those in Centers was posted Wednesday by the Army and requires the exclusion be completed by August 11, Lieut. General J. L.

Dewitt, commanding general, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, announced.

PAY CHECKS TOTAL \$12,156.95

A total of 1230 paychecks were given out between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, it was reported by Center Cashier J.J. Hodel. This record was due to the splendid cooperation of policemen who were in charge, and the workers themselves, he stated.

Checks totaling \$12,156.95 were given out to 1463 people for the month of June.

The three new Civilian Exclusion Orders involve an estimated total of 6,150 Japanese from designated regions of Fresno and Tulare counties. Evacuation will be from the northwest corner of Tulare County, including Dinuba, Visalia and Orosi districts.

Registration of the Japanese affected by the new orders will be conducted July 27 and 28 at the Civil Control Stations in Sanger, Reedley and Visalia Municipal Auditorium. (From the Tulare Advanced Register)

ASSIGNMENT SLIPS IMPORTANT

The Assignment Office advises all workers of the importance of their reassignment slips in claiming pay roll checks and in making any adjustment of irregularities in the amount of wages received, declared James Eaki.

In the event that we are relocated in a permanent Center, the checks will be forwarded to all individuals at their new addresses; therefore, it will be necessary to present your work slip at the Relocation Center for proper identification.

Duplicate copies may be secured at the Assignment Office in the Administration Building.

Heads Responsible for Blankets

Family heads are reminded that they are fully responsible for all Government blankets issued to them and all unused blankets should be returned to the Personnel Account Office, announced Susumu Kojima, Personnel Assistant.

People who have borrowed Government blankets from individuals are requested to return them or have the necessary adjustments made. In case of adjustments, the heads of the families involved should report together.

LABOR POLICIES FORMED

E. Kawai is Labor Adjustment Officer

The Personnel Section and the operating divisions are directly responsible for maintaining satisfactory relations with actively assigned workers.

The Labor Relations functions include the maintenance of uniform labor policies. These policies shall include the rights of workers, relations with the operating divisions and the workers in the handling of investigations, warnings, suspensions, and complaints. Every effort shall be made to eliminate causes for complaints. Each worker, regardless of wage classification, is expected to extend his whole-hearted cooperation in propounding harmony between the worker and the supervising personnel.

Workers have the right to select a representative of their own choice for the purpose of adjusting grievances with the Personnel section.

The services of labor relation adjustment officer of the Center, Eric Kawai, appointed by R.E. Caviness of the Personnel Division, will be available to all jobs, and whose functional duties are to assist all divisions in labor relations problems. The labor relation adjustment officer is not requested to spy on workers nor to investigate into other legitimate activities.

If the plans drawn by them are authorized by Pixley, the blueprints are taken to the Corporation yard and construction begins.




