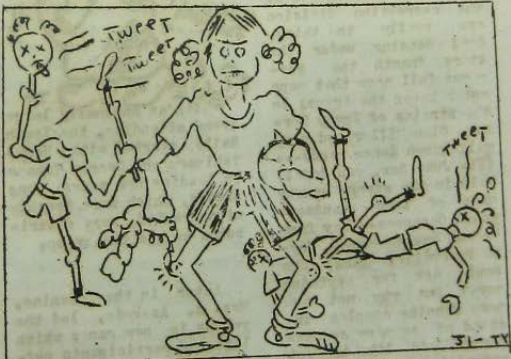

BEEF LEAVE FOR

WORKERS CENTER MONTANA

A group of forty-five
men, some looking forward
to adventure, others to
hard work, and still others
who were still weighing the
matter in their heads, left
the Center a few weeks ago.

With a guarantee of free
transportation to and from
their destination, Townsend
Montana, these men all left
voluntarily to work in the
sugar beets. Adequate hou-
sing, adequate facilities
for their own cooking, no
less than prevailing wages
and medical care at a rea-
sonable fee were guaran-
teed. If these men find
conditions unfavorable they
have the right to leave
whenever they wish, other-
wise they will stay until
November 1, 1942. For the

blocking, thinning and
and heine of the plants,
they will receive \$10 an
acre.

Although the men will be
required to stay in their
particular county, they
will be able to go out of
town, according to local
authorities. Also, their
status will remain the same
and after the job is fin-
ished, they will be sent
back to their families or
friends.

In order to recruit the
men, Mr. L. J. Holmes and
Mr. J. R. Stewart, repre-
sentatives of the American
Creptal Sugar Company; Mr.
H. R. Lee, representative
of the W.R.A., and Mr. L.
S. Brady and Mr. L. M. Di-
xon from the United States
Employment Service worked
at the Open Air Pavilion.

HOSPITAL NEWS

Visiting hours will be
strictly limited to 2:00-
4:00 and 7:00-8:00 P. M.
Please observe this sche-
dule as certain work must
be done by the nurses such
as bathing of the patients,
changing of the linen, etc.
as well as medical care.

All children from five
years to twelve years and
younger children who have
been immunized will be
Schick tested and if found
susceptible to diphtheria,
will be immunized as well.

ISOLATION

Visitors for the isola-
tion patients are absolu-
tely forbidden. These pa-
tients are isolated for the
purpose of limiting the in-
fection and preventing the
spread to other persons.
If the precautions were not
necessary, these patients
would be cared at home with
the medical staff making
home calls instead.

IMMUNIZATION

All persons must be ino-
culated against typhoid and
small pox.

All persons having had
the prophylactic ino-
culation before coming to this
center must exchange their
certificate with the offi-
cial public health certifi-
cate.

All children from six
months to five years who
have not been immunized a-
gainst diphtheria will be
given three inoculations
at intervals of four weeks.
