## CENTER EVACUATION STARTS TOUS SAT.

All workers and their families composing the advance execution group will leave by train for Sacaton, Gila giver Center in Arizona on the evening on July 18. From that time on Trulock will be evacuated by blocks commencing on ar about July 25 and continuing each day until completed.

All freight and baggage will be inspected prior to final packing. Freight and baggage will be transported by freight shipment and by baggage cars. Articles needed during the twenty-four hour trip will be taken by the family on the train as hand luggage.

Freight for shipment should be ready for rick-up on the morning of evacuation or one day prior if possible. The articles taken with you on the train must be limited to actual needs and to that which can be carried with you from the Center to the train.

Freight can be prepared for shipment immediately. When ready notify Internal Security Police who will inspect the property before erating. The Works Division will transport it to the depot for shipment as soon as it is ready. All articles that can be done without for a few days should go be freight. Limit baggage to those things which you think you will need immediately upon arrival. This should include bedding, toilet articles, and personal necessities. Trucks will pick up freight and baggage at your apartment door .

It is mandetory, under the United States Army orders, that premises must be cleaned up by the evacuest. This means that windows must be clean, floors swept, latrines, blowers, leundries, and mess hells cleaned up and (Cont'd p. 2, col. 2)

DR.WM FURUTA

Last week it was pointed out that certain "germs" or nicro-organisms were responsible for a large number of diseases affect-

ing man.
The nature of these mirobes is fascinating. We are now femiliar with the minuteness of their size. the body of man is made up, as you know, of countless groups of simple microscopir particles called cells. our bodies were pirtured as a complex building of be the individual bricks. When we realize that a body contains life, then it would be logical to assume that cach individual call ture, dospite the minuteness of i's size. Now, could it by that "germs" or microbos are living beings also? It seems possible, and redical science has definitely proven so, but not until earlier herous of medicine had spont their lives in pooring through their antique micross opes to demonstrate this point.

Chemically and biologicelly speaking, the composition of a one-celled mierobe is quite similar to that of a men. Microbes must food; they must have a source of air

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for respiration; although, some obtain them in a slightly different manner and they must seek shelter from sdverse temperature conditions for survival. Finally, they reproduce new offspring like the higher forms of life; although, the rate of their multiplication is much more rapid.
