TURLOCK ASSEMBLY

Fri., July 17, 1942

CENTER EVACUATION STARTS THIS SAT.

All workers and their families composing the advance evacuation group will leave by train for Sacaton, Gila River Center in Arizona on the evening of July 18. From that time on Turlock will be evacuated by blocks commencing on or about July 25 and continuing each day until completed.

All freight and baggage will be inspected prior to final packing. Freight and baggage will be transported by freight shipment and by baggage cars. Articles needed during the twenty-four hour trip will be taken by the family on the train as hand luggage.

Freight for shipment should be ready for pick-up on the morning of evacuation or one day prior if possible. The articles taken with you on the train must be limited to actual needs and to that which can be carried with you from the Center to the train.

Freight can be prepared for shipment immediately. When ready notify Internal Security Police who will inspect the property before crating. The Works Division will transport it to the depot for shipment as soon as it is ready. All articles that can be done without for a few days should go by freight. Limit baggage to those things which you think you will need immediately upon arrival. This should include bedding, toilet articles, and personal necessities. Trucks will pick up freight and baggage at your apartment door.

It is mandatory, under the United States Army orders, that premises must be cleaned up by the evacuees. This means that windows must be clean, floors swept, latrines, showers, laundries, and mess halls cleaned up and

Answer: There will be 500 people going out each time. The groups will go by blocks. The second group will go a few days after the first, after which the next groups will go out each day, a few days before each group

GERMS

Turlock assembly

Last week it was pointed out that certain "germs" or micro-organisms were responsible for a large number of diseases affecting man.

The nature of these microbes is fascinating. We are now familiar with the minuteness of their size. The body of man is made up, as you know, of countless groups of simple microscopic particles called cells. If our bodies were pictured as a complex building of some sort, the cells would be the individual bricks. When we realize that a body contains life, then it would be logical to assume that each individual cell must also be a living structure, despite the minuteness of its size. Now, could it be that "germs" or microbes are living beings also? It seems possible, and medical science has definitely proven so, but not until earlier heroes of medicine had spent their lives in peering through their antique microscopes to demonstrate this point.

Chemically and biologically speaking, the composition of a one-celled microbe is quite similar to that of a man. Microbes must feed; they must have a source of air (oxygen)

for respiration; although, some obtain them in a slightly different manner and they must seek shelter from adverse temperature conditions for survival. Finally, they reproduce new offspring like the higher forms of life; although, the rate of their multiplication is much more rapid. This is especially unfortunate when we are dealing with harmful or pathogenic (pathos--to suffer, genesis--to create) micro-organisms, for in attacking us they are able to make up for their lack of size of their huge numbers.

When a man tackles a new job, he is rather awkward at the beginning and his efficiency is very low. But with time and experience his skill increases and he does the same amount of work better and in a shorter time. Interestingly enough the same applies to these microscopic imps. As they go along spreading disease from man to man their virulence (power of infection) increases, so that those attacked in the later course of an epidemic suffer greater.
