

### NOTICES SENT ASKING TULEANS TO MAKE PLANS

Invitations are now being sent to all Tule Lake residents who are eligible to relocate, but who have not yet begun their relocation planning, to appear at the Relocation Moadquarters, Building 5, high school grounds, to meet with specified advisors, W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, announced today.

Pointing out that after today only 22 more days remain for relocation planning with WRA assistance, Holland urged that people so invited keep their appointments with the advisors to insure that their planning be completed by Dec.

15, the deadline. As an added service to people who must complete their planning by Dec. 15, the colony has been divided into districts and specific advisors have been assigned to each to keep appointments with planners, folland said, to speed the planning program with a expenditure of minimum time, which daily is growing shorter. Persons allotted appointments will have direct priority to see their advisors at the times set, he said.

## FIRST GROUP OF "REPATS" LEAVES THE LAKE TODAY

Voluntary repatriates to J pan---the first to leave Tule Lake Center---departed today by special train operated under the Department of Justice for Seattle, where they were scheduled to board a ship tomorrow.

Four hundred and twentysix single men, 18 years of age or over, were on the Tule Lake list of volunt ry repatriates, no women, children or family groups being considered by the Department of Justice for this sailing.

Tule Lake repatriates who were on the TRA payroll were paid in cash before their departure. A special service was set up by the Finance Department to certify the amount of gross earnings on WRA payrolls to meet the Department of Justice requirement for establishment of the amounts of money allowed to be tak-en, and the Bank of America sent representatives to the center to issue travelers checks to conform with Department of Justice regulations in the carrying of funds.

The special train, to consist of six coaches, a Fullman car for the handicapped or infirm, a diner and a baggage car, will proceed directly to the ship side at Berth 146, Wilmington.

W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, will ride the train as WRA reprosentative. Otokichi 0zaki will be evacuee train captain, and Dr. Kazuo Mi-yamoto will be the train physician, and he also will be in direct charge of the Pullman. Train monitors for the other cars will be Shizahura Sumida, Car Aş Yoshio Ozuma, Car Ca Umesuki Matsuo, Cer D; Kyoji Naito, Cer E; Sizuma Tagawa, Car F; and Horiaki Atsuumi, Car G, vitt. Kaetsu Furuya as alternato. In addition, a car mother will be appointed for each car.

Charles iller, RA sq-pervisor of the Northern Culifo nia area at San Francisco, this week lauded the stand of the Southern Pacific Railroad in its refusal to remove an Issei track crew from Placer County, and charged the California Preservation Society, headed by Charles DeCoasta of Auburn with trying to intimidate the Southern Pacific "just as it, in the past, has tried to intimidate all the people of Japanese ancestry from returning to Placer County."

"The Southern Pacific, more credit to it, has taken a decisive stand in the matter by refusing to grant the request that the crewbe removed," said Hiller. ### REHUNCIANT CASE DRAWS COMMENT FROM S. F. PAPER

The San Francisco News on Nov. 14 published the following editorial comment on the filing of suits by 985 residents of Tule Lake Center in connection with their renunciation of United States citizenship:

"Thoroughly democratic is the step taken by Japanese Americans interned at Tule Lake to test in the courts the validity of the regulation under which they are held for deportation. They have the right to use our American instruments of justice to establish their claims. And every American should be anxious to see them fully protected in that right.

"It must be recognized that the position in which they were placed by their sudden removal to relocation centers in 1942 created artificial and temporary conditions for them far from normal. Under the stress of these conditions it doubtless was hard, if not impossible, for many of them to reach sound decisions. If any act of our own Government led them to wrong decisions they certainly are entitled to make that known in orderly legal procedure.

"The whole question of their removal from their homes on the coast is shrouded in considerable legal fog. Perhaps their move will result in court decisions that will clear a ay some of the doubts and establish a new basis of precedent to guide future actions if, perish the thought, a similar emorgency should arise again

## IS HOME OF 158 GIVES REPORT ON NORTHERN SANTA AROMICANS CALIF. 19015 BMG FACERES

The Hollywood Citizen reported this week that 158 Japanese Americans who live ed in the vicinity of Santa Monica before the war have been housed in vacated Army barracks on Pico Boulevard upon return from WRA centers. Others are accommodated in trailers and in a building at 1624 16th Street which formerly was used as a school.

George Okuda, spokesman for the Santa Monica returnees, told D. C. Kree-man, acting mayor, that the children of all the returned families have entered school and that there has been "no trouble."

Thirty-seven evacuees also arrived recently in a group in the Sacramento area from Rohwer, aboard a train which had been routed through Los Angeles. Eleven of them found temporary housing in Sacramento with friends and relatives, nine went to their former homes in the Florin district, and the remainder were provided housing at Camp Kohler.

#### LIOUOR LICENSES SSUED TO SEVEN

Press dispatches from Los Argeles reveal that the California State Board of Equalization has granted liquor dispensing licenses, chiefly for grocery store sales of beer and wine, to seven Japanese Americans in various parts of the These were among the first to go before the board since evacuees began returning in numbers from the WRA centers. The applicants mostly were resuming businesses discontinued at the time of evacuation.

#### MANY JOBS, SAYS PLACEMENT OFFICE

Placement Officer John Matsumoto announced this week there are many vacant jobs at present in different sections and divisions, which must be filled immediately. de requests all qualified workers to apply at the Placement Office, located at 1208.

The Tule Lake Relocation Division received this week from Charles Miller, WRA Supervisor in Son Francisco, an up-to-date outline of tem orary public neusing facilities available to relocatees in the lort ern California agea.

The Federal Public Hous- waiting list. The Bucc. ist special projects for relocatees at Camp Kohler in Saoramento County, and at Hunters Point and Fort Funston in the San Francisco district. Camp Kohler and Fort Funston provide armytypo barraoks remodeled into apartments of various sizes, and the housing at Hunters Point is of the dermitery type. Light, water and heat are provided at all three projects. Bade, blankets, cooking and sating aquipment and other basic articles of furniture are furnished, and household belongings of relocatees should not be shipped to the projects because there are no stor-

age facilities. Space for 200 persons was reported available by Miller at Camp Kohler, and for 25 at Hunters Point. Fort Funston, with accomodations ready but not actively operating, can be made available to a minimum of 50 persons desiring it at once and a minimum of 50 more needing it within a short time thereafter.

Hostel facilities are available also in every Northern Culifornia district, Miller reports, and suggests that relocatees make full use of these hecause it is much simpler to find permanent housing after arrival in the Northern California area than it is to arrange it before leaving the center.

Housing for veteran and service-connected families is being made available by the FPHA at Richmond, and such families also are being given priority by housing authorities at San Francisco, South San Francisco, Marin City, Oakland, Borkeley, Alameda, Vallejo, Benicia, Sacramento, Stockton and Fresno. These units mostly are full at present and hostel reservations are recommended by Miller for those on the

MAN CONVICTED OF ATTACK ON 3 IN RIEVADA CAFE

A jury in Elko, N.V., last Saturday convicted J.mes Monroe, a railroad worker, of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to do bodily harm, in connection with the shooting last January of Japanese in a Wells, Nev.,

Monroe fired several shots from a pistol after Harry Gomi, cafe cas ier, had declined to cash a check, the bullets striking not only Gomi but Frank Fujini and Ken Kikumoto, fellow cafe workers who went to Gomi's aid.

Defense attorneys presented Monroe's plea of innocent as based on grounds he was not able to remember what had occurred. George Wright, district attorney, argued that Honroe ad hidden his gun after the shooting and had escaped from Wells on a freight train. He was apprehended in Twin Falls, Ida.
