After the tickets are issued, no one will be able to enter any mess hall without the proper mess ticket and identification.

This system is expected to assure an accurate head count so that the proper amount of food will reach each mess hall.

Effective Monday, March 13, all W.R.A. automobiles and trucks will remain in the motor pool when not actually being used on official business, according to a release from Harry L. Black, acting project director.

"With the exception of the Police Department, Fire Department, Maintenance, Hospital, and Project Director, all cars and trucks will be issued on a Trip-Record card only and no equipment will be permitted outside the

motor pool between 6 p.m. and 7 a.m. except in cases of emergency or where prior approval has been granted by the chief of the division involved," it is stated in the release.

It was made clear that the transportation of evacuee employees, as well as appointed personnel, to and from home or mess halls is not official business and strictly prohibited.

Evacuee employees are, therefore, given permission to report for work at 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. and to leave place of employment for dinner at 11:30 a.m. and for supper at 5 p.m.

## STORE TO BE USED BY CO-OP

"Some people are under the impression that the Co-op is going to finance the construction of the new department stores to be built, but that is erroneous," he said.

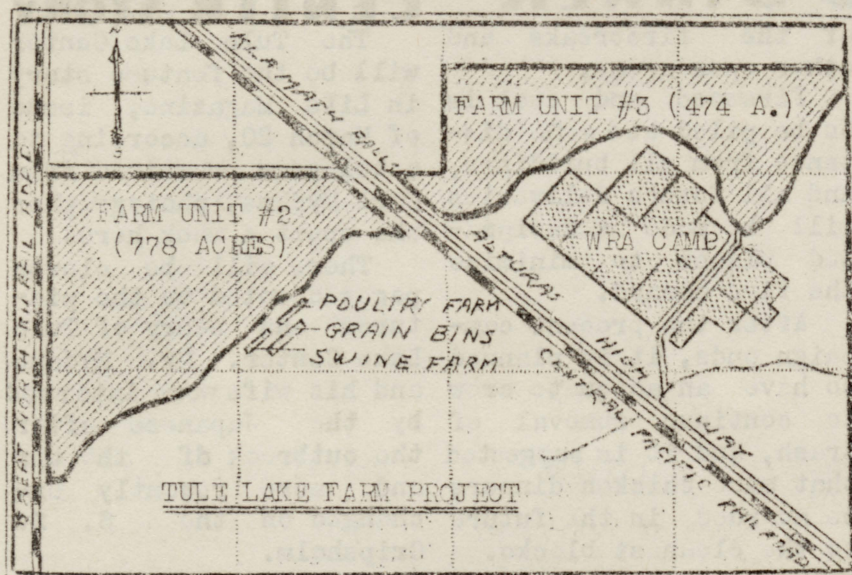

## TWO UNIT FARM PLAN COVERS 1252 ACRES

Tentative plans for a farm program during the current year have been established with the appointment of Sam S. Kawamura, supervisor; Mitsuto Miho, assistant supervisor and Hiromi Imahara, office manager, according to W. T. Jarret, farm superintendent.

Farm units number 2 and 3 will provide the ground for the local 1944 farm program. The new units comprise 1252 acres. Last year 2,630 acres were being farmed.

Farm unit 2 embraces 778 acres--292 acres of alfalfa, 71 acres of clover and 65 acres of grain. The remaining area of 350 acres will provide vegetables for local consumption. Plans call for the raising of beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, daikon, garlic, lettuce, onions, peas, potatoes, radishes, spinach, nappa and turnips. As much as 150 acres will go to potatoes.

Grain will be grown extensively in Unit 3. Unit 3 with 474 acres surrounds the greater portion of the center.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REQUESTS COOPERATION OF RESIDENTS

A release from the fire department asks the cooperation of center residents in fire prevention and fire protection measures.

Many fire hazards have been created by the hasty war time construction of the project and especial vigilance is necessary on the part of all, it is stated.

## DOCTORS APPEAL TO RESIDENTS

## CENTERWIDE PROGRAM TO BE AT AUDITORIUM

The doctor shortage makes necessary an appeal to center residents to refrain from making any but emergency calls between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., according to a statement from the base hospital signed by Drs. Reece Peardicord, G. K. Hashiba, H. Loebmann, Harry K. Marks, K. Miyamoto, Y. Nakano, and Paul Yamaguchi.

"We do not have a sufficient number of doctors to relieve one of duty on the day following a hard night and must appeal to the fair-mindedness of the residents," it is stated.

### SPAIN CONSUL DOES NOT ACT FOR NISEI

The Washington office of WRA has been provided with a copy of a letter from De Amat, consul of Spain, regarding military service for citizens of Japanese ancestry. The copy was furnished through the State Department.

The letter quotes a memorandum received from the Embassy, as follows: "The protecting power is not authorized to act on behalf of American citizens, and it is solely with the American authorities that they, the American citizen, must deal in these matters--American military service--since these authorities are the only ones who can solve such problems.

"May I also point out, as has been frequently and repeatedly emphasized by the Spanish delegates in their visits to the various centers, that the above mentioned memorandum is not limited only to military service, but to anything that concerns American citizens. They must approach their own American authorities, not the protecting power, whose duties are toward the Japanese nationals in the United States."

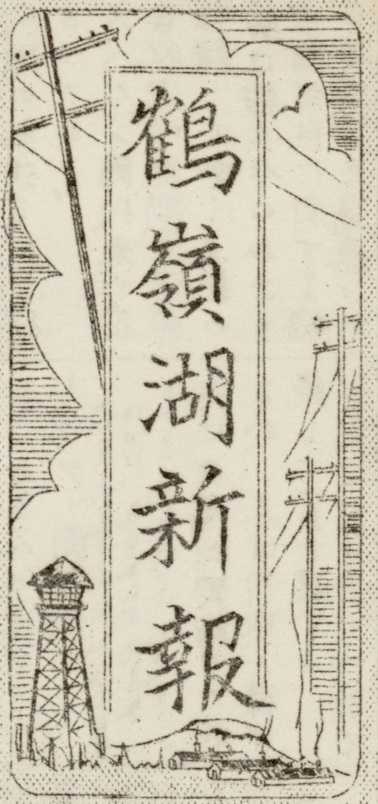
