# NEW SERVICE FOR THOSE PLANNING To GO OUTSIDE

Establishment of a widespread service aimed specifically to meet information needs of people who are interested in resettling, and who desire to keep abreast of opportunities on the outside and of activities of resettlers who have preceded them, was announced officially today by the Administration.

Under the newly established system, various media of information, including a new publication, Resettlement News, are being made available to center residents at the Block Managers Headquarters and at the Block Manager's Office in each block under the personal supervision of Joe Thomas, block managers supervisor. The service is directed specifically by the Administration; it is not under the sponsorship of the Block Managers.

Information is similarly being made available at other places -- in addition to the Relocation Office, where detailed information always is available -- including now the various welfare offices, the high school library, Colonial Peace Headquarters, the farm.

Resettlement News, which is a part of the new information set-up, will not duplicate any news of general interest which will appear as always in the NEWELL STAR, the Administration said. It will confine itself to information of interest to people who are free to resettle, and to people who may be interested in the doings of friends who have relocated. Additional copies of it will be available at all times in the Relocation Office and the Reports Of-

# 100TH INFANTRY RETURNS FROM FUROPEAN FRONT

To the joyous salute of sirens and whistles, the super-transport Gen. W.P. Richardson docked in New York last week carrying 1802 soldiers, many of them Nisei -- veterans of Salerno, Anzio, Cassino, and the winter's warfare in Italy's mountains. As the 20,000-ton vessel came into the pier, the 372nd Army Band from Camp Kilmer, N.J., began playing, but the music was drowned by the cheers of the veterans.

"The mixed contingent included men of the Fifteenth Air Force, the Japfantry Battalion, and the First Armored Division," said the New York Times, in describing the arrival. "Soldiers of the Thirtyfourth Division, with whom the Nisei troops of the 100th Infantry Battalion served, highly lauded the fighting qualities of the Japanese Americans, Some said that the Nisei battalion was one of the finest in the Army.

"Pfc. Yoshimasa Kawaguchi, 27-year-old former carpenter in Hawaii and a rifleman of 21 months overseas experience, said that he was 'damn proud and happy' to have fought with the American troops. The Germans, he said, were 'damn tough eggs--very good fighters

"As S/Sgt. Nobuo Tokunaga, 25, of Hawaii, walked down the gangway, he was loudly cheered by American troops."

By noon of June 8, the Times said, all the soldiers were on their way to Camp Shanks, N.Y., with most of them being scheduled for reassignment.




