JUNE 18-24 PROCLAIMED CENTER CLEAN-UP WEEK

June 18 to June 24 has been proclaimed Clean-up Week by the Administrative and Evacuee Representative Committee, Samuel Owen, chairman, announced today.

Sponsored by the Fire Department and by the representative committee, the primary aims of Clean-up Week are promotion of a clean, healthful community and elimination of fire hazards.

After an inspection tour by the committee at the conclusion of Clean-up Week, a choice of a chicken dinner or a picnic at the new picnic ground will be awarded to the cleanest block in the center. The winning block in each ward

CA PICNIC PARK OPEN TO PUBLIC

Buck Dimon, supervisor of Community Activities, this week announced the opening of the CA Picnic Park, located south of the administrative area.

The grounds are open to the general public every day except Saturday when it is reserved by CA for 200 to 250 division and section workers.

It has green benches to accommodate 200 persons, two barbecue pits, a fish pond, trees, a rock garden, picnic tables, and is equipped with lights for night picnics. Additional improvements are being made by CA, Dimon said.

Parties who wish to use

will be presented an "E" pennant.

Judging will be based on the following points: (1) Removal of rubbish within the block. (2) Removal of unnecessary combustible material under buildings and from porches, kitchens, boiler rooms, and service buildings. (3) Removal of grass and weeds around the buildings. (4) Neatness in arrangement of personal property. (5) General cleanliness and appearance of the yards.

Two dump trucks will be dispatched to each ward during Saturday and Sunday to pick up rubbish.

4 C'S MAY ASK FOR CHANGE IN DRAFT CLASSIFICATION

Dillon Myer, director of WRA, this week notified all centers of the latest advice of the War Department regarding Selective Service Classification IV-C, with information that those who desire may receive early consideration for reclassification. The notice follows:

"Men who now have a Selective Service Classification IV-C, and who desire an early reconsideration of their draft classification should communicate with the Provost Marshal General's Office, War Department, Washington, D. C., and their cases will

HOSPITAL ASKS COOPERATION OF CLINIC PATIENTS

Colonists with passes to the Outpatient Clinic should report when the clinic opens or soon thereafter, Jack Sleath, principal medical officer, stated today.

On the passes to the clinic are indicated the time they become valid and the time they expire. When residents report anytime between the hours mentioned, clinic hours are unnecessarily prolonged.

Therefore, residents are asked to arrive promptly. For example: An Ear, Nose, Throat Pass reading from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. means that all patients should report to the clinic between 1 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. This allows the hospital time to have the patients treated and back to the colony by 4 p.m., the time the pass expires.

All IV-C classifications are in the course of review, but a communication by the individual himself will insure an early review and may assist in bringing about a changed classification."

NEW SERVICE FOR THOSE PLANNING To Go OUTSIDE

Establishment of a wide-spread service aimed specifically to meet information needs of people who are interested in resettling, and who desire to keep abreast of opportunities on the outside and of activities of resettlers who have preceded them, was announced officially today by the Administration.

Under the newly established system, various media of information, including a new publication, Resettlement News, are being made available to center residents at the Block Managers Headquarters and at the Block Manager's Office in each block under the personal supervision of Joe Thomas, block managers supervisor. The service is directed specifically by the Administration; it is not under the sponsorship of the Block Managers.

Information is similarly being made available at other places--in addition to the Relocation Office, where detailed information always is available--including now the various welfare offices, the high school library, Colonial Peace Headquarters, and the farm.

Resettlement News, which is a part of the new information set-up, will not duplicate any news of general interest which will appear as always in the NEWELL STAR, the Administration said. It will confine itself to information of interest to people who are free to resettle, and to people who may be interested in the doings of friends who have relocated. Additional copies of it will be available at all times in the Relocation Office and the Reports Office.

In connection with announcement of establishment of the new service, William Holland, relocation program officer, called attention to the fact that additional information is always available in the Relocation Office, where offers of outside job opportunities and reports of

PATIENTS ARE ASKED TO LEAVE VALUABLES HOME

Persons who are to be admitted to the hospital should leave their valuables with their families or friends since the hospital will not assume any responsibility when losses occur, Jack Sleath, principal medical officer, stated today.

When a person has no relatives or friends, he may leave his valuables with the chief nurse, who will keep the valuables in safekeeping until he is discharged.

To bring large sums of money and other valuables to the hospital and to keep them in or around the beds is an extremely bad practice, for they may become lost in the waste paper sacks, bed linen, and other places.

When valuables are lost, it not only represents a loss to the individual concerned, but it also ex-

poses hospital employees to unjust accusations and criticisms, according to the principal medical officer.

100TH INFANTRY RETURNS FROM EUROPEAN FRONT

To the joyous salute of sirens and whistles, the super-transport Gen. W.P. Richardson docked in New York last week carrying 1802 soldiers, many of them Nisei--veterans of Salerno, Anzio, Cassino, and the winter's warfare in Italy's mountains. As the 20,000-ton vessel came into the pier, the 372nd Army Band from Camp Kilmer, N.J., began playing, but the music was drowned by the cheers of the veterans.

"The mixed contingent included men of the Fifteenth Air Force, the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion, and the First Armored Division," said the New York Times, in describing the arrival. "Soldiers of the Thirty-fourth Division, with whom the Nisei troops of the 100th Infantry Battalion served, highly lauded the fighting qualities of the Japanese Americans. Some said that the Nisei battalion was one of the finest in the Army.

"Pfc. Yoshimasa Kawaguchi, 27-year-old former carpenter in Hawaii and a rifleman of 21 months overseas experience, said that he was 'damn proud and happy' to have fought with the American troops. The Germans, he said, were 'damn tough eggs--very good fighters.'

"As S/Sgt. Nobuo Tokunaga, 25, of Hawaii, walked down the gangway, he was loudly cheered by American troops."

By noon of June 8, the Times said, all the soldiers were on their way to Camp Shanks, N.Y., with most of them being scheduled for reassignment.

"Mississippi," starring Bing Crosby, W. C. Fields and Joan Bennett will be shown. The film portrays show boat life in the South.

If the movies conflict with other activities or unfavorable weather prevails, changes will be announced through the block managers, it was stated.

Two more 35mm sound Japanese motion pictures, "Hana Aru Hyoga" and "Kappore Taiheiki," will start Monday evening, June 18, and continue each night through Friday at the high school auditorium, the Community Activities Section announced this week.
