STOP MONTHIY INTERVIEWS FOR WELFARE CRANIS

The Social Welfare Section announced today a change in its practice of re-interviewing monthly each family receiving aid.

Hereafter, the Social Welfare Section announcement said, persons and farilies whose situations remain the same may receive a grant in the same amount from month to month without being re-interviewed. If persons or families who are receiving aid are not called in for re-interview, it does not mean that the aid will be discontinued.

When changes occur in the status of an individual or a family, in the income or ability to work, the Social Welfare Section is asking them to assume the responsibility of notifying their district welfare office of the change. When such a change occurs, the Social Welfare Section will re-investigate the needs of the person or family concerned.

ASSISTANCE GRANTED TO RESETTLERS

Need or the possibility of need for temporary or emergency assistance on the outside is not a bar to resettlement, the Administration explained today in suggesting that families who require such help may

inquire regarding its possibilities at the Relocation Office or at the Social Welfare offices in connection with their re-

settlement planning.

The responsibility for granting assistance to evacuees in need now is divided between the URA and the Social Security Board, the Administration explained, and resettlers needing household or other temporary assistance may determine before they leave the center the amount of such assistance which may be available to them.

The Social Security ard, through the state Board, and local departments of welfare, will aid persons who need medical or other emergency help, in addition to old-age assistance, aid (cont'd on page 2)

RATION BOOKS NOW ISSUED AT THE LAKE CAMP

Ration books now are being issued at Tule Lake Center to all evacuees leaving on both short-term passes and terminal departures, the Administration announced today.

The new procedure is intended to eliminate difficulties some evacuees have experienced in their new localities, it was explained, particularly for those who leave on short term and convert to terminal without returning to the center.

Heretofore, people leaving the center for resettlement have applied for ration books when reached their destination. Now they will take their ration books with them from

the beginning.

If for any reason a ration book is not issued before a person leaves the center, the District Relog cation Officer in the new locality will ask the local Office of Price Administration to honor and accept the resettler's request. Where there is no relocation officer, a relocatee may wire his previous center of residence, and the project will advise the local board whether a ration book has been issued previously. If one has not been issued, the project will request the board to issue one.

The Washington office of the OPA is instructing its local boards on this new procedure, the Administration has been informed.

When evacuees on shortterm passes return to the center without having converted to terminal departures, the ration books issued to them will be turned in and "tailored" for the length of time they remain on the project before terminal departures.
