PROSECUTION IN CO-OP CASE SOON

Charles Lederer, district attorney of Modoc County, has reviewed evidence developed by Internal Security and personally questioned several persons in connection with the investigation of loss of \$3359.25 from a safe in the business office of Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Inc., and expects to start proceedings for prosecution soon, the Administration revealed this week.

After reading transcripts of the evidence collected by Internal Security, Lederer came in person to Tule Lake to interrogate several persons because of important developments in the case, said Joseph DeWitt, chief of Internal Security.

"Internal Security has developed the evidence very effectively," said Lederer after he had completed the interrogations, "and there will be some prosecution in this case before very long."

Lederer, who as district attorney is the prosecutor of cases in the state court in Modoc County, came to Tule Lake from Alturas, his headquarters.

ARMY ALONE DETERMINES WHO CAN RETURN—PRATT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30 --The following statement was issued today by Major General H. C. Pratt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command:

"It has become increasingly apparent that an erroneous impression is being conveyed to the public as to the responsibilities of the various agencies concerned with the return of persons of Japanese ancestry to the West Coast States. This situation is evidenced by 'Letters to the Editors,' news items, radio releases, public statements, etc., which not only dis-

JAPAN NOW REPRESENTED IN U. S. BY SWISS GOVT.

WASHINGTON--In response to an inquiry from the Swiss Legation whether this government would be agreeable to the assumption by the Swiss government of the representation of Japanese interests in the United States except Hawaii, the Department of State has informed the Swiss Legation that the United States government has no objection to such an assumption of the protection of Japanese interests by the Swiss government. The Swedish government protects Japanese interests in the Territory of Hawaii.

Since late March, 1945, when the Spanish government relinquished the protection of Japanese interests in the continental United States, the Japanese government has been without neutral representation in the United States. As dis-

tinct from the interruption of the representation of Japanese interests in the United States, the Swiss government has continued to represent American interests in Japan and Japanese-occupied territory, as it has since the beginning of the war.

The Japanese government has placed many restrictions upon the activities of Swiss officials representing our interests in the areas under its control and in some cases has even refused to permit Swiss and other neutral representatives to visit prisoner of war and civilian internment camps in the Far East where Americans were held.

The Swiss Legation at Washington told the Department of State that the Swiss government would not agree to represent Japanese interests in the United States until it had received from the Japanese government agreement in principle to permit Swiss representatives to visit all camps where American nationals are held in Japan and areas now occupied by the Japanese armed forces. These conditions were presented to the Japanese, and the Japanese War Ministry told the Swiss government that

may or may not be permitted to return to the designated exclusion zone of the Western Defense Command. In making this determination, I am governed solely by military considerations and by none other, for there exists no legal authority for anyone to restrict the movements of an individual within the United States because of economic, social, or other similar reasons.

"In executing this responsibility, I have access to the records of the various intelligence agencies of the government and am assisted by a large staff of experienced personnel. I feel, therefore, that I am able to determine which individuals may prove potentially dangerous to the military security of the West Coast and such individuals are not allowed to return. Possibly, although I doubt it, certain individuals may possess information against persons of Japanese ancestry which I do not have. If such is the case, it is a patriotic duty to convey that information to me, and I will welcome such assistance.

"The War Relocation Authority was created to assist in the proper relocation of those persons of Japanese ancestry who were required to leave their homes. The formation of this authority was a result of the recognition on the part of our government of its obligation to alleviate the hardships imposed upon many thousands of our citizens merely because of the accident of birth. Demonstration Given By Center Fire Dept.

A crew of the Tule Lake Fire Department Monday demonstrated to representatives of the volunteer fire department of the town of Tulelake the fine points of hose laying and pressure pumping.

The demonstration was requested by the town firemen, who became impressed with the work of the Tule Lake Center fire fighters when a truck and crew went to the town of Tulelake in the middle of the night several weeks ago to help extinguish a serious fire.

The evacuee fireman displayed the technicalities of several hose lays in quick time, the fastest being 400 feet of hose laid

with Siamese extension for a double waterstream in 40 seconds. The town firemen also were concerned about methods for pumping water from irrigation ditches and putting it under pressure for fire fighting, which is a problem which confronts them often in the agricultural community of Tulelake. This also was demonstrated by the center fire fighting crew. Afterwards, the visiting firemen inspected the fire stations and equipment.

Gengo Endo, chief of the Tule Lake Fire Department, directed the demonstration, which was put on by the Station 3 A shift under command of Captain Mutsuo Nishida.

The representatives from Tulelake for whose benefit the demonstration was made were Bruce Brickell, chief of the volunteer fire department, Clifton Hines, Jerry Van Buskirk, Toad Boyd, Burris Short, and Al Porter.

Samuel Owen, Tule Lake fire protection officer, Clifford Parker and George Calvert, assistants, and Glenn Rumley, WRA fire protection chief from Washington, participated.

it agreed in principle to permit the Swiss Minister in Japan to visit prisoner-of-war camps in Japan and Japanese-occupied territories.

When these camps have been visited this government will be able to obtain from the Swiss government more complete reports of conditions under which Americans are held by the Japanese. It is hoped that Japanese treatment of American nationals will thereby be improved. For these reasons the United States government is glad to have the Swiss government assume the protection of Japanese interests in the United States.

The United States government in accordance with its treaty obligations and international commitments permits representatives of the protecting powers to visit all camps where enemy nationals are held.

NOTE: The Administration wishes to advise Japanese nationals of their right to communicate with the Swiss Legation, Washington, D. C., on any of the matters which they normally would take up with the Protecting Power.

SAFETY COUNCIL GIVES WARNING

Warning was given today by the Tule Lake Safety Council of the danger to children who play near irrigation ditch culverts in the colony.

At a recent meeting of the safety council a report was heard of a child who fell into a ditch and was carried through a culvert by the force of the water, narrowly escaping drowning. The child was revived and sent to its home, but the possibility of more such occurrences is causing the council considerable concern, it announced.

As a result of this accident, the council has asked the Colonial Peace Department, through Joseph DeWitt, chief of Internal Security, to keep all children away from the irrigation ditches near the culverts.

425 ROHWERITES REACHES COAST

The first complete railroad train carrying evacuees from Rohwer Center back to their homes in California arrived on the coast early this week, the Administration announced today.

The train left Rohwer carrying 425 passengers, with seven coaches, a sleeper reserved for the aged, infirm and sick, a diner, and two baggage cars. Harold Ickes, secretary of the Interior said in Washington the arrangement for the train was in conformity with regulations of the Office of Defense Transportation.

The 425 passengers included 125 Rohwer families, with nearly 100 children under 15 years of age.

A few families planning resettlement in the Mountain States left the train at Pueblo for Denver, Col. and at Ogden and at Salt Lake City, Utah, but most went through to the coast.

Many former Rohwerites disembarked from the train at Lodi, Sacramento, Stockton and Fresno to disperse to their homes in nearby towns and rural communities. From Fresno, two coaches, the sleeper and one baggage car went on to Los Angeles, carrying returnees to Southern California.

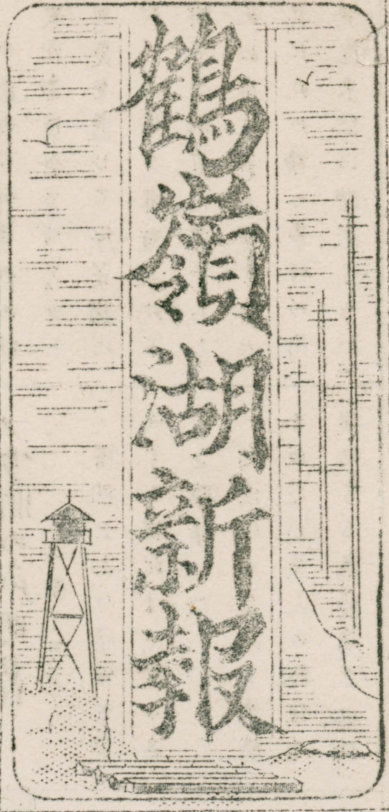

瑞西政府は米国内に日本人の権益擁護に當る日本帝國の代表國たる交渉に於て日本政府管掌下の捕虜キヤンプの定期訪問の許可方を條件としたが日本政府は該申請を承諾し其代價國たる事を依頼した事は既報の如くであるが、今回國務省より該問題に關し、合衆國政府と瑞西公使との交渉の書狀を記載した報告書
