DEAR SALLY:

I'm so sorry to hear about Kitti being sick. I hope you don't come down with anything now. Say, what has any of your sisters said about going or coming to Amache first. You know you need help wherever you go. If you are having a hard time caring for the kids now, altho you have to go elsewhere to wash etc. You don't do all the cooking yet do you. In other words there will be conveniences outside here too but there will be other duties. You are going to have to work just as hard. If I had my own business I could help you. It isn't like when I took care of Mike and you went to school. I'm working for some one else where your mind has to be in good condition. Part of the reason for my losing the first job was because I didn't impress the boss or tried to impress him on how much I knew. He didn't think I knew very much when it was because of the chief Draftsman.

Today was my first day with Mr. Schwen. They have a much larger office than Lapidus. There are three other persons working for him. All of them are very experienced. One of them is like the chief Draft at Lapidus. Thinks he is right. Very cock sure etc. He knows everything but he has been wrong already. I just don't know how to deal with him. I guess if he is wrong I'm going to tactfully

Say so just to make him respect my knowledge. That way we will get along otherwise he might think that I don't know anything. This fellow is an Austrian. The other fellow is swell. We get along O.K. The other party is a lady dressmaker who works part time for an engineer.

Well, I went out house looking last weekend and come across this one. What do you think of it. This house was a duplex with a connecting door. 5 bedrooms upstairs plus one bath. Main floor 2 kitchen, 2 living rooms, downstairs another bath room. There are 2 coal burning kitchen stoves, no central heating, no refrigerator. The house is in fair condition. The glasses in some windows are broken which is incidental. The house cost \$2500 plus fees and etc. Cash down is about \$800<sup>00</sup> and the rest is just on the mortgage which could be as less as \$40<sup>00</sup> a year and yet the place is yours. In other words there is a \$2000<sup>00</sup> mortgage on it held by a church group which would probably be easier to deal with than a bank. This house is in a small town of Roslyn which is 45 minutes from Penn.

Station on the S. J. railroad. The house itself is three blocks away from station and across the street from Roslyn High School. The town doesn't grow much or go down.

We could get an kerosene heater in a large size which would do the job of heating the house without aid of a fan. There are two fire places plugged up. One of which I could fix up to burn wood. The hot water is had by the heat from the cooking stove.

3. Electricity + water is hooked up but no gas. I don't know how much gas would cost either but I'll find out. I think I can borrow the down payment from two or three individuals. It is a very beautiful country side. The house is pleasing too. I'm looking up other adds I saw in the Sunday Times.
