# Civic Center Program Should be Completed in 3 Years Says Director

Building of the five-story Police Headquarters in the area bounded by First, Temple, San Pedro and Los Angeles Streets "should be completed in three years," City Planning Director Charles Bennett told a gathering of approximately 50 businessmen at the Metropolitan JACL installation luncheon Wednesday.

Mr. Bennett, who was main speaker at the conversion meeting of the Downtown JACL chapter into a business and professional organization, added that the money has already been appropriated to acquire the necessary property.

The most difficult thing about this phase of the Civic Center development plan will be the moving out of tenants of apartments and hotels in the area, he said. Mr. Bennett also pointed out that public buildings are not an asset to retail business, although they might be all right for wholesale

WASHINGTON- The House of Representatives approved and sent to the White House this week a bill authorizing the attorney general to settle enemy alien property claims up to \$1,000.

The so-called Contraband Bill will reimburse aliens who surrendered contraband articles such as short-wave radios, cameras, binoculars, firearms and other weapons at the outbreak of the war.

A House Judiciary Committee report said that many of the items were stolen and in many instances Japanese did not insist upon the return of their property "for fear of alienating public opinion or of bringing reprisals upon themselves.

#### Movie Reviews

#### Of 'Red Shoes' and 'Paisan'

Living on the wrong side of the tracks does have an occasional drawback, one of the most frustrating of which is the fact that we have to travel clear across town to see any movie worth the price of admission.

One of the best movies we have ever seen — and we have seen "Children of Paradise" as well as "Shoeshine" — is still playing at the Fine Arts Theater on Wilshire near La Cienega. The movie is "The Red Shoes."

The story is a beautiful tragedy with macabre overtones, adapted from the Hans Christian Anderson fairytale of the red dancing shoes which dance the wearer to death.

After we sat entranced for twoand-a-half hours, we wondered what it was about the foreign films that made them generally superior to the Hollywood product. We came to the conclusion that it was honestly and imagination — some things that money cannot buy.

Artistic honesty is a quality one feels in any creative effort—in the casting of a movie, for instance. Moira Shearer who plays the ballerina, Anton Walbrook who plays the Svengalilike impresario, and Marius Goring who plays the impassioned composer, were thoroughly convincing, because they played as though the most important thing was to bring the characters to life and not to make stars of themselves.

This entire dedication to make "the play the thing" was felt in the natural, lucid screen play and in the deftly woven musical back-ground.

And imagination — imagination lifted the film out of the ordinary into a glorious experience.

There was imagination in the ballet sequences, in the interweaving of the ballet's and the ballerina's stories, in the costumes designed by Jacques Fath, in the movie as a whole.

The ballet of the Red Shoes particularly shows what heights the movie art can achieve with a judicious use of imagination. Needless to say, one need not be a ballet fan to appreciate it.

#### PAISAN


Misrepresented in advertising and overadvertised, Roberto Rossellini's "Paisan" was somewhat disappointing in the light of another Italian film, "Shoeshine."

Being a series of vignettes, wholly unrelated except for the fact that they were episodes in the liberation of Italy, the film lacks the unity of "Shoeshine's" one story.

We also felt too much of a conscious striving for effect, particularly in the Negro soldier and the streetwalker sequences, anefort to achieve something meaningful which failed in the attempt.

The simplicity of the first vignette of the G. I. from Jersey and the stoicism of the last episode, however, makes the film well worth seeing.




