Full cooperation by the Corporation yard workers during the evacuation was asked by H a r r y Miyake, Erie Kawai, and Ken Utsunomiya, at the mass meeting held in the yard Thursday afternoon.

Because evacuation can not be fully satisfactory without the yard workers, they asked for volunteers to stay until the last day of the moving.

Miyake, chief commissioner, said to the some 195 workers, "Although other Centers have dropped the Works" and Maintenance Department as soon as the evacuation notice came, we want our Works Division to stay and make ours a most successful evacuation."

Chief of the Labor Relations Board, Kawai added that the Tulare Works Division was the "most efficient of all the Centers in California."

"Tou a ve certainly contributed greatly to the morale of the Center," were the words of praise by Ken Utsunomiya, service commissioner.

NEW MEAL SYSTEM

To go into effect about Monday, is an improvement on the meal ticket system, stated Tets Mayeda, Commissioner of Feeding. The plan calls for a signboard to be placed near the entrance of each mess hall, with interchangeable signs denoting the time and group who is entitled to eat at that particular time.

When this system goes

into effect, everyone must show their meal tickets, and those who fail to do so must go to the rear of the line. Persons who have lost their tickets may obtain new ones at the Council Headquarters in F-7. The purpose of this adjustment is to eliminate chances for a shortage of food in certain kitchens because of suncuthorized persons eating in them.

TO HOUSE 10,000

Of the 5,979 Japanese who will be evacuated from the Reedley, Sanger, and Visalia districts, those from Sanger will be sent to the Gila River Relocation Center, it was reported in the Tulare Daily Times. Reedley and Visalia residents will be evacuated to Parker, Arizona.

Evacuees in the Turlock Assembly Center are already in the process of moving to Gila River, and this Center will follow soon. The removal of those in the as yet unevacuated zones will be completed by August 11, while we here in this Center are not scheduled to leave for several weeks.

TO BE DISTRIBUTED FROM MONDAY

Issuance of August coupon books totaling approximately \$9500.00 will begin Monday morning, 9 of clock at the cashier windows was revealed by J. J. Hodel, Center cashier. Centerites are asked to adhere to the following schedule in procuring their books.

Monday, August 3-C and D Tuesday, August 4-E and F Wednesday, August 5-G and H Thursday, August 6-J and K Friday, August 7-L and M.

The windows will be open from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 n.m. to 4 p.m. during the week. Saturday, books are obtainable from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Any persons living in the above mentioned units not able to come during the scheduled hours or days, may do so on the day following, announced Mr. Hodel.

We here in the Tulare Assembly Center have made an enviable record for teamwork, discipline, and ability to accomplish things.

Are we, who have made such a record in the past, belie all our achievements by moving in a disorderly haphazard way, or are we going to crown our glory with the most efficient movement of all the Centers?

The answer to this question lies with no one but you, and you alone.

History of the State of Arizona

Throughout the annals of state history, Arizona has witnessed one exciting event after another.

Long before this region was known to the white men, a large and superior race inhabited it. Marco de Nizan explored the rough country in 1539 in search for precious metals, which encouraged Vasquez de Coronado to follow suit. He organized an expedition the following year and visited the Moqui villages and the New Mexican pueblos.

The year 1596 saw the little establishment of a ony, and in 1689 the Spaniards were driven out of colony, the country; by 1695 they had recovered nearly all of it, and by 1720 Jesuit missionaries had established a number of missions, ranches and mining stations. Serious Indian outbreaks occurred in 1802 and 1827, and finally this territory, known today as Arizona, was acquired by the United States in 1848. She was admitted into the Union in 1912."




