I hope this letter finds you in the best of health. As for us we will remain here indefinitely. We have no intentions of returning to California as yet. The other valleyites feel the same.

I had intended to write you earlier but I felt the bitter anti-feeling there might re-act against you should I write you a letter. I do not know why they should portray such an un-American attitude. My grandson, William Miyagi, was drafted from school and now he is in France fighting for a democracy we do not know. It is a sad state of affairs but we are victims of circumstances. Please write sometimes a letter from a Caucasian is something to cherish. Then and only then ~~will~~ feel that my grandson's blood will not flow in vain.
