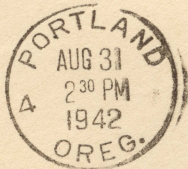

Dear Ken - Another Sunday afternoon, so far Chape and I are alone, so we are trying to write a few letters! We have had a few good services today over the radio, so you have services there every Sunday. It was so cool this morning but is nice and warm this afternoon, if we should get some settled warm weather I think Chape would feel better, this cold, damp weather isn't so good for him. Last week Dorothy Seely and myself were out to the Center, had a lovely visit with Jerry Williams and Kigo, Eva did not know we were there, so we did not see her, we saw Mrs. Ni, Mr. Maeda, Rev. Hayashin and wife. It was very hard to say good-bye to Teru and the children, but I think it may be better for her when she gets to her new home, they will have more privacy, and can keep the children together better, we hope so anyway, and we are also hoping so much that their daddy will be reunited with them, I read your letter to Teru, which gives us a ray of hope. However, I would not worry too much about the children, for I feel that their training, and the Christian principles which they have always been taught, will stand by them now, even under these conditions which make it hard for them, especially in these years when they need the influence of home life, and father and mother.

I heard you won the prize in Baby Golf, I am sending you the little clipping from the newspaper which tells of the scout activities, we are proud of Willie, that he has made Life Scout.

We are going on much the same here, did you get the golf balls I sent you, I do not expect you to write to me as I always hear from you through Teru, I know it keeps you busy writing her and the children. Chape thinks about you and speaks of you so often, he often says he wishes he could write to you, I think his hands are a little better, but
